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St. Paul's, Egremont, Harvest Home Services

Oh Sunday last Thanksgiving services were held in the afternoon and evening in St. Paul's Church, Egremont. Large congregations were at both services despite the inclement weather. The guest speaker at both services was Rev. Carman J. Queen, B.A., L.Th., rector of St. Paul's Church of Prince-on. Rev. Queen chose his text for the afternoon service from St. Matthew's Gospel, 13th chapter, 9th verse—"Who hath ears to hear, let him hear". In this parable from which the text was taken, Jesus is not putting emphasis upon the sower, nor yet upon the seed, vastly important as they are, but upon the different kinds of soil upon which the seed falls. The speaker compared the sowing of the seed in the field, to the sowing of the seed of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in the hearts of men and women and stressed the reception given that seed by those who hear. Live up to the light that you have and it will grow brighter. Fail to do so and it will fade into darkness; put your faith into practice and it will become a fuller faith. Fail to do so and you will cease to believe.

At the evening service, the speaker chose as his text: "From whence come wars and fightings among you? Come they not hence; even of your lusts, that war in your members." James 4: 1. The most painful and serious question confronting humanity today is "How can this horrible war be ended?" The speaker maintained that it is a solemn fact to all religious thinking people, that a conviction is steadily gaining ground and power, that religion and religion only can end all wars. More and more the realization is growing in the common soul of mankind, that the roots of war lie in the spiritual realm; that nations will fight just as long as their minds and hearts are wrong, and their attitude toward one another, one of suspicion, jealousy, and distrust. It is the voicing of a conviction, that the final and radical cure for war and all other evils, can be found only through human hearts, transformed into the likeness of the heart of Jesus Christ.

At both services, thanksgiving hymns were sung, and pleasing duets given by Mrs. Thos. Bell and Mrs. Joseph McCaslin. The church was suitably decorated with fruit, grain and flowers.

Police Court Cases on Friday last

Leonard Vollett pleaded guilty to a charge brought by George Trafford, of converting money belonging to plaintiff to his own use. Vollett is driver of Trafford's truck and returning home from sale of a load of wood, passed Trafford's home as he saw no light there. He afterwards spent the proceeds from sale of wood \$36, whereupon Trafford laid the charge. As Vollett had made restitution, he was let off on suspended sentence for one year on paying costs, \$6.25.

Jas. Hamilton vs Don McArthur of Egremont, a charge of trespassing was adjourned until next Court, Nov. 17th, at 2 p.m.

M. L. Dankert, Hanover, pleaded guilty to a charge on not equipping his motor vehicle with flares on Saturday, Oct. 7th, when Gordon Dixon of town took to the ditch to avoid a collision with him, thereby damaging his car. The accident occurred at Hutton Hill. Dankert was fined \$15 and costs amounting to \$19.25, which was paid forthwith.

Wm. Willoughan of Tara, formerly of Glenelg, pleaded guilty to driving a car in a careless manner, when he bumped Webster's and Alf Weppeler's cars on Lambton St. on Sept. 20th. He has since paid for damage to Weppeler's car and was fined \$10 and costs, amounting to \$16.50.

The action against James Morrison, charged with reckless driving when cars driven by him and Albert Maynard, Glenelg, accidentally collided in front of Varney Church, was adjourned from last court. The magistrate announced that he had decided to dismiss the charge, as he could not find from evidence given that Morrison was negligent, or had failed to take ordinary precautions.

No More Written Middle Sch. Exams.

There are to be no more written examinations in middle school matriculation in Ontario schools. By this stroke the Ontario education department hopes to save from \$100,000 to \$150,000.

Consent of the three universities had to be secured for the move, and at a conference recently, representatives of the three agreed to the proposal but insisted that as a means of insuring them against unprepared students coming up to the universities the written examination should be the only one in upper school matriculation.

Cost of paying hundreds of examiners and others officials, of preparing and printing the papers of distribution and collection, etc., runs into close to \$150,000, it is said for the middle school examination alone.

The change means that passing the middle school matric in 1940 means having the O.K. of the principal and teachers. Their recommendation will be final.

Next examination that is likely to be shorn of the written test is the high school entrance. Gradually through the years the number of those recommended by principals and teachers has grown greater than those writing. This year over 7,000 were recommended in Toronto and about 1,500 got their pass by writing. It is known that the heads of the education department are disposed to wipe out the written entrance examination.

ARMISTICE DAY TO BE OBSERVED IN CANADA

Despite the second Great War Canada will observe Remembrance Day, Saturday Nov. 11th, the anniversary of the conclusion of the first Great War, as a statutory holiday, a state department official announced. Because of such action taken by the state department, it will not be necessary for municipal councils to declare November 11th a holiday by proclamation.
