Farmers Must Be Ready To Meet War Demand

Dominion Minister of Agriculture Urges Every Canadian Farmer to Make Careful Survey of His Projects -Cheese and Bacon Import-

Agriculture Minister Gardiner has urged the Canadian farmer to make a careful survey this fall of his farm projects in view of the demands that war may make necessary at any time.

The Minister said in a statement that "on the thoroughness of this fall's preparations will depend in a more vital way than ever before the quality, quantity and cost of his final product a year hence."

Three Considerations The three considerations deserving urgent attention, according to Mr. Gardiner, are grain crops and feed supplies, live stock, and seed requirements.

He recommended maintaining or improving the present hog production, for "bacons, hams and fats are bound to be required in greater volume if the war continues."

It was also important that farmers should not change from cheese to butter production, for both the cheese and bacon production would have an important bearing on Canada's food effort.

For Farm Pazards - Doctor Finds Agriculture Industry Has Large Accident Toll

Of Danger Zone

Doctors took a look at the record last week and found a dangerour spot in this highly mechanized continent - on the farm. "Farming is an exceedingly dan-

gerous occupation, the hazards of which are not universally appreciated," Dr. John H. Powers of Cooperstown, N.Y., reported in the American Medical Association's Accidents Occurring in Barn-yard

"Agricultural accidents were responsible for nearly one-fourth of all serious injuries treated at a medium sized rural hospital in the central part of New York State, during the years 1929-1938 inclusive," he said.

The barn is the centre of a danger zone, he indicated, for 50 per cent, of all the farm eccidents occurred in it or in the barnyard.

"Farm tools and implements animals, machinery and vehicles all contributed their share of injuries in about equal proportions," he said.

Q.—How can I keep cheese A .- Wrap it in cheesecloth that has been wrung out of vinegar.

pewter? A .- A good cleanser is a mixture of salt with an equal quantity of flour and vinegar. Apply a paste made up of these ingredients and allow to remain on for

an hour; then rub off. Wash with water; then polish. Q.—What is a good headache remedy? A .- A remedy that is often effective is to lay thin slices of a raw potato across the forehead.

Or, place a pinch of salt on the tongue and allow it to dissolve; then in about ten minutes take a drink of cold water. Q .- How can I improve the flavor of tea?

A .- Add a small piece of dried orange peel, that is kept in a glass jar, to the teapot before pouring in the boiling water. Q.—How can I remove a blood stain from silk material.

A .- A blood stain on silk material can be removed easily if a few inches of white sewing silk is moistened on the tongue, rolled into a ball, and then rubbed on the stain

Q.—How can I keep pumpkin for a long time? A .- Pumpkin should be dried if one wishes to keep it for a long time. Cut it into thin slices and place around the stove to dry. Before using, soak for an hour or two, then cook in the usual man-

If It Is To Stay Sweet - Bacteria Are Everywhere

There is only one way to keep milk sweet, and that is to keep it clean and cool. The milk as produced by the cow is practically all free from bacteria, and will keep for a long time if not allowed to become contaminated with bar' ia from the air, dirty utensils, or other sources. One should '-ep in mind that bacteria are everywhere and that it is very hard to keep them out of anything that one is handling. When th bacteria get into the milk they grow and act on the milk sugar, forming lactic acid and thus causing sour milk.

Use Sterile Utensils If you take the milk as the cow produces it and handle it in such a manner that the bacteria count is low, you can keep it sweet for a long time by keeping it at a temp-

erature of 45 degrees Fahrenheit or below. The reason we want to keep it cool is that bacteria grow very slowly at a temperature below 45 degrees Fal -nheit, while they grow very rapidly at ordinary temperatures. The way to handle mill so that it will keep sweet is to draw it from clean cows into clean, sterile or freshly scalded utensils and allow it to come in contact with nothing but those things which have been thoroughly scalded. Cool it to 45 degrees Fahrenheit within 15 minutes after milking and keep it cold until it is us-
