O.Sound Smashes Slot Machine

Battered beyond recognition, its carefully balanced wheels and machinery pounded into wreckage by the hammers of lusty police officers and its flashing lights dimmed for all time, first fruits of the current police campaign against gambling devices was committed to a watery resting place on Friday. Acting on the recommendation of Magistrate E. C. Spereman, local authorities destroyed the cash-vending slot machine that had been seized earlier in the week from Percy Howe, local Chinese restaurant proprietor—the wooden parts supplementing the fuel supply for the City Hall heating system, and the ruined working parts being dumped far out in the bay. Owen Sound Police are determined that the current epidemic of money grabbing devices to be found in many of the city's business places, must be done away with and this action was merely a starting point for the campaign which is aimed to rid the city of these nuisances. Evidence of the amount of money taken in, is to be found in the fact that there was close to \$20 in large five-cent pieces in the machine taken from the Chinese restaurant. This amount, incidentally, will go to the support of the Crown.
