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Sudden Death of Walter Thomson

Mr Walter Thomson of Hutton Hill, well-known section man on the C.P.R., died suddenly in Toronto last Thursday while at railway work there, where he had been temporarily transferred just three days previously.

Walter was 55 years of age, being born in Dumfermline, Scotland, in September 1884. In 1910 with others of the family, he emigrated to Canada, first living in Owen Sound for a few years, then removing to Durham. He served overseas in the 147th Grey Battalion.

Several years ago he was wedded to Miss Ada Scott of Toronto, who survives him; also two brothers, George in Scotland, and David in Durham.

The deceased was a member of Durham Baptist Church, his pastor, Rev. J. T. Priest conducting the funeral service from his home in Bentinck on Saturday afternoon. It was under the Veterans' and Masonic auspices, each organization attending in a body.

The pallbearers were two Masonic brethren, Thomas Henderson and C. H. Moffat, two military comrades, J. B. Duffield and Arthur Connelly and two fellow workmen of the C. P. Railway, Jack Gibson and George Miles. The Masonic service was in charge of Worshipful Master McChure of Williamsford and the firing squad of militia was under the command of Sgt. A. G. Lawler, with Comrade Padfield sounding the last post.

Wm Courtt Died as Result of Stroke

A well-known South Glenelg resident, Wm. Courtt died on Tuesday afternoon at 4.30, after being in failing health for some time. A stroke the previous night from which he did not regain consciousness, was the immediate cause of his demise.

The deceased was a son of the late Mr and Mrs Henry Courtt, born in Bentinck at Lamhast 68 years ago, but when quite young came to the south line, Glenelg, in which locality he has since resided. About twenty-five years ago he married Emma Pinkerton, who survives with one daughter, Mrs John Whyte (Helen) of Priceville. Three sisters and three brothers also survive: Mrs Catherine Grashy, Durham; Mrs Chris. Wise and Mrs Emma Sachs, Hanover; Jacob, of Sperling, Man.; Peter and Michael of Dodsland, Sask. A brother and a sister are deceased.

The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon from his late residence to Ebenezer cemetery.

At Durham Council meeting on Monday night, Reeve John McGirr of Glenelg waited on the members, to request their support in having the Co. Roads Committee take over as a County Road, the balance of the road (about 3 miles) from Markdale to Highway No. 6. The 7 miles from Markdale west along 10th con, is known as No. 14 Road, the remaining 3 miles from dead end of No. 14 to Highway 6 is known as Braun's rideroad. The Council passed a resolution to be sent the Good Roads Com., urging this be done.

Coun. McKay reported the ditch for College—George St. sewers to be cleaned out, but yet. This ditch Mr E. Watson annually complained flooded his land.
