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## Honored Fallen Comrades Saturday

About thirty of the war veterans with nineteen of the new recruits in militia, preceded by Durham Band, paraded from the Armoury to own Hall at 11 a. m. Saturday for the annual Remembrance Day service. It being too chilly to hold the complete service at the Cenotaph. The hall was soon filled with citizens. Mayor Bell presiding. Rev. S. W. Hirtle led in prayer, after a two minute silence had been observed. Rev. M. H. Farr read the scripture, and Rev. W. H. Smith gave the address: a timely and thoughtful message for such an occasion.

The closing part of the service was held at the cenotaph, the ladies of the I.O.D.E. marching with the band, veterans and militia back from the hall. Wreaths were deposited from the Red Cross Society by Mrs. David Jamieson; from the I.O.D.E. by Miss Calder, regent; from the veterans, by Mrs. C. E. Wolfe; and the Province of Ontario by Mrs. Davis. Comrade Art McGowan read the roll of fallen comrades. Comrade G. R. Padfield read the Last Post, and Rev. R. Honeyman closed with the benediction.

The local militia and the veterans led by the band, marched to the Baptist Church Sunday morning, where Rev. J. T. Priest spoke on "Confusion or Christ?" basing his sermon on a statement of James. "Where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work," and the words of Jesus, "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God." Mrs. J. T. Priest presided at the organ in the absence of Miss Eva Redford, owing to illness, and the choir sang H. W. Petrie's "Onward to Fields of Glory." The church was filled to capacity.

## Large Barn Burned North of Hanover

Over \$5,000 loss was suffered Friday evening, when flames of unknown origin razed the large barn of William Curtis, 3 miles north of Hanover, destroying the entire season's crop and all the farm machinery that was stored inside. With the assistance of neighbors, all stock with the exception of one calf was removed from the flaming structure, but efforts of a bucket brigade to stem the blaze were of no avail.

The reason for the blaze remains a mystery. Mr. Curtis was in his house, not far from the barn, when he noticed the flames, and by that time the fire had gotten such a start that nothing could be done to save the building. It is thought that the flames started on the second floor.

Partial insurance was carried on both the building and the contents.

## Granted Divorces at Supreme Court

Four divorce actions were the principal constituents of Thursday morning's session of the Supreme Court of Ontario, sitting last week at the Grey County Court House, Owen Sound, under the Honorable Mr. Justice E. R. E. Chevrier. None of the four were contested, and in all cases divorce was granted.

Decree nisi was granted James Lawson Herbison of Owen Sound, from Olive Jean Herbison (nee Duns-moer) of Durham. Stewart Rose was named as co-respondent. Herbison was granted custody of the child. W. D. Hen y. K. C. represented the plaintiff. William Robinson of Derby Township was granted divorce from Mildred Robinson, in which case Reuben Kirk was named as the co-respondent. The separation claim of Sophia Gilling of Owen Sound against William R. Gollinger naming Nettie Brown as co-respondent and asking \$30 per month alimony, was granted, as was the divorce action of Charles Morris, seeking separation from Mary Jaze Morris, and naming Daniel Leslie Patton as the co-respondent.

## Prizes Presented to Home Imp. Winners

Durham Agricultural Society sponsored a special evening in Queen's Church last Friday, for the presentation of the prizes won in the recent Farm Home Improvement competition. This was a province-wide contest arranged by the Farmers' Magazine, and the feature of the night was lantern slides exhibited by the editor of that journal, Mr. Hedge, showing the forty-seven first prize winning homes and grounds throughout the province.

There were three Grey Co. winning homes shown, Durham Agricultural Society's being Mr. Wm. Bogle of Vaney. Mr. Bogle placed 11th in the Provincial contest, and to him Mr. Hedge presented his magazine's prize. He stated the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture had given them a tremendous amount of support in their contest, and he congratulated the local Society on their successful local contest. Mr. Bogle in expressing thanks, stated they had found more pleasure in having a better home and grounds, and also valued appreciative remarks by the neighbors.

Previous to this presentation, all the other winners in Durham Agricultural Society contest each were presented with their award by Rev. M. H. Farr, one of the local directors.

Also present was Mr. McDonald of the Wawanesa Fire Insurance Co. He stated that the contests was a benefit to all taking part, and helped to keep young people on the farm. His Company also awarded prizes, judging all 47 first prize winners in other contests, as to safety of risk, from a fire hazard standpoint. Every fire loss, he said, is a waste and an expense to others. Fire prevention was most important, then fire fighting, then fire insurance. The Inspector of the Fire Marshal's Dept. did their judging, awarding 10 prizes, and there was only 10 points difference between the 1st and 10th prize winner. In this Wawanesa contest, Mr. Bogle was awarded second place in province. Calling both Mr. and Mrs. Bogle to the front, Mr. McDonald presented to Mrs. Bogle, their 2nd cash prize of \$50.

President John C. Hamilton, who presided during the evening, called Mr. James Mather forward, and presented to him the diploma awarded annually by the Ontario Fall Fairs Association to the local worker whom the Directors select, as having rendered devoted service to the Society in past years. Mr. Mather expressed his appreciation, urged all to compete at fairs and accept the judge's decision cheerfully.

Interspersed between the addresses and views, was instrumental music by the Edge brothers, Scotch song by Danny Edge, and music by the Junior Farmers' orchestra, comprising David Allen, Allie McGill and Allister Allioe. All taking part in the evening's program were members of the Agricultural Society, or the Junior Farmers.

Rev. W. H. Smith was also called on, and gave a number of appreciative and snely remarks.

A chicken supper was served at the close to about fifty guests.

## Armless Man Gives Stirring Talk

Sponsored by the Tuxis and Trail Ranger boys' groups, William R. Watson of Toronto, armless author and lecturer, spoke eloquently to an almost filled house in Knox Church Tuesday evening. His life has been devoted to helping those crippled like himself, and his travels in search of information have taken him all over Canada Great Britain, and most of Europe.

Born without either hands or arms, the speaker has learned to make his feet and mouth do the work of the missing members, and has been able to acquire a fine education and graduate in law. He is a graduate of the University of Alberta. Using his toes like fingers, he is able to feed himself, wash, shave and otherwise take care of himself. Equally outstanding is the spirit optimism and cheerfulness that has driven him past failure and physical difficulty, and has made possible the success which he has achieved.

His address dealt mainly with his travels, in which he and his wife had conducted an investigation into what various countries were doing for the physically disabled within their borders. They had spent a considerable time in Germany, and he related many interesting experiences and opinions formed by his travels abroad.

## OBITUARY

### WILLIAM H. FALLAISE

After being in ill health the past four or five years, William Henry Fallaise died on Saturday morning at the home of his niece, Mrs Arch. M. Beaton of Glenelg, being critically ill a few days only. He has made his home with Mr and Mrs Beaton since the death of his wife sixteen years ago.

Deceased was born on the old Fallaise homestead near the township hall, Glenelg, in October 1860, and has lived most of his life in Glenelg. He was married to Mary McGillivray about fifty years ago, after which they resided on the 3rd concession N.D.R. Glenelg and later moved into Durham on Garrafrax St. south. They were here only a few months when Mrs Fallaise died, and he returned to the farm. One sister, Mrs Elizabeth Book, of Schomberg, survives.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon from the Beaton home, conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. T. Priest of Glenelg Centre Baptist Church. Mrs Priest sang the solo "That Beautiful Land." Interment was made in Durham Cemetery.

Of New Grey County Home Beautification Bureau

At an organization meeting Tuesday afternoon at Dept. of Agriculture office in Markdale, both rural and urban representatives met and formed a society to sponsor home beautification throughout Grey County. Grey is the sixth Ontario County to organize, Bruce being just ahead of us.
