This Chore Need Not Be A Bore If You Tackle the Job the Right Way

Washing-up if you let it-becomes a nightmare in the day time. There's nothing like a muddled sinkful of dirty dishes to put a gloom on things. But tackle the job the right way and it isn't so bad.

First-when you clear the table -put the saucepans to soak. Stack all the things neatly and sort them out; wash things of a kind all together.

Save The Pieces Glass is washed first, silver next, the cleaner dishes next, and the more soiled ones and the

saucepans last. Always add a little soda to the washing-up water, except when you are going to wash aluminum. Soda darkens it.

Glasses that have held milk should be rinsed in cold water after being washed, and a few drops of washing blue added to the rinsing water gives a sparkle to any glass.

Cut Glass

The best way to wash cut glass is with a soft brush, drying with a Turkish towel.

Silver should be washed promptly after it is used, as particles of food may discolor it. It should be washed in hot, soapy water and rinsed in very hot, clean water and dried carefully.

# Ontario Boasts **Highest Prison** Population Yet

23,649 Inmates In Prisons of Province Is All-Time Record - 'Dumb,' Untrained Youths Make Up Largest Section

Ontario's prisons have their higest populations in history this year, according to the ann report of prisons and reformatories. Issued by Hon. H. C. Nixon, provincial secret ry. From a low of 7.867 in 1917 there was a steady increase to 21,421 in 1930.

Big Increase Since 1"34 The total dropped to 13,509 in 1934 and then rose again. Since that year the increase has been startling, establishing an all-time

peak of 23,649 in 1938 and another big jump to 27,926 in 1939, C. F. Neelands, deputy provincial secretary, reported,

"The huge majority, as in former years, are young, below average in mentality, low in academic education and almost totally lacking in vocational training," Mr. Neelands said. "Add to all these the comparative ease of obtaining the deadly weapons and speedy cars, and we have the natural result, the reckless, youthful gun bandit. He is particularly a North American product, and is a problem whether at liberty or in prison."

725 Under 20 in Reformatories In the reformatories were 725 orisoners between 15 and 19 years old: 655 between 35 and 39, and 532 between 25 and 29; 645 between 30 and 34; 55 between 35 and 39, and 532 between 40 and 44. There were 33 prisoners over 70.

More prisoners are sentenced to 30 days and under 60, with 1.884 drawing this sentence. During the year, 42 escaped and were recaptured, with only five evading pur

Most frequent crime against property is larceny or theft, with 1.014 sentenced. False pretences brought jail terms to 261, and "borrowed" ears to 259.

Drunk and disorderly charges led "crimes against public order and peace," with 1,227 sentenced.





One of the first things to be decided in this early preparation is the making of the Christmas cake. The last recipe is also very old, but very reliable and does fill the requirement for those who wish a cheaper and simpler cake and one which must be made within a week or so before the holiday season.

ENGLISH CHRISTMAS CAKE 1 lb. flour (browned in oven.


