E. D. McClocklin

An outstanding figure in the civic life passed suddenly away Friday afternoon, Nov. 24th, in the person of Edwin David McClocklin, only five days before his sixtieth birthday.

The deceased was born in the British Hotel, in Durham on November 29th, 1876, and has lived his entire life here.

While he had not the benefit of a High School or College education, Mr. McClocklin was a well-educated and well-informed man, held in the highest esteem by the entire community.

He was as well an ardent and well-informed lodge man, being a past D.D.G.M. of Durham Lodge A. F. & A. M., a past principal of Durham Royal Arch Masonic Chapter, a Past Grand of the Oddfellows Lodge and a member of the I. O. Foresters.

The funeral service was held from Trinity Church on Monday afternoon, of which he was a member. His rector, Rev. M. H. Parr, conducted the service, the church being filled with mourners.

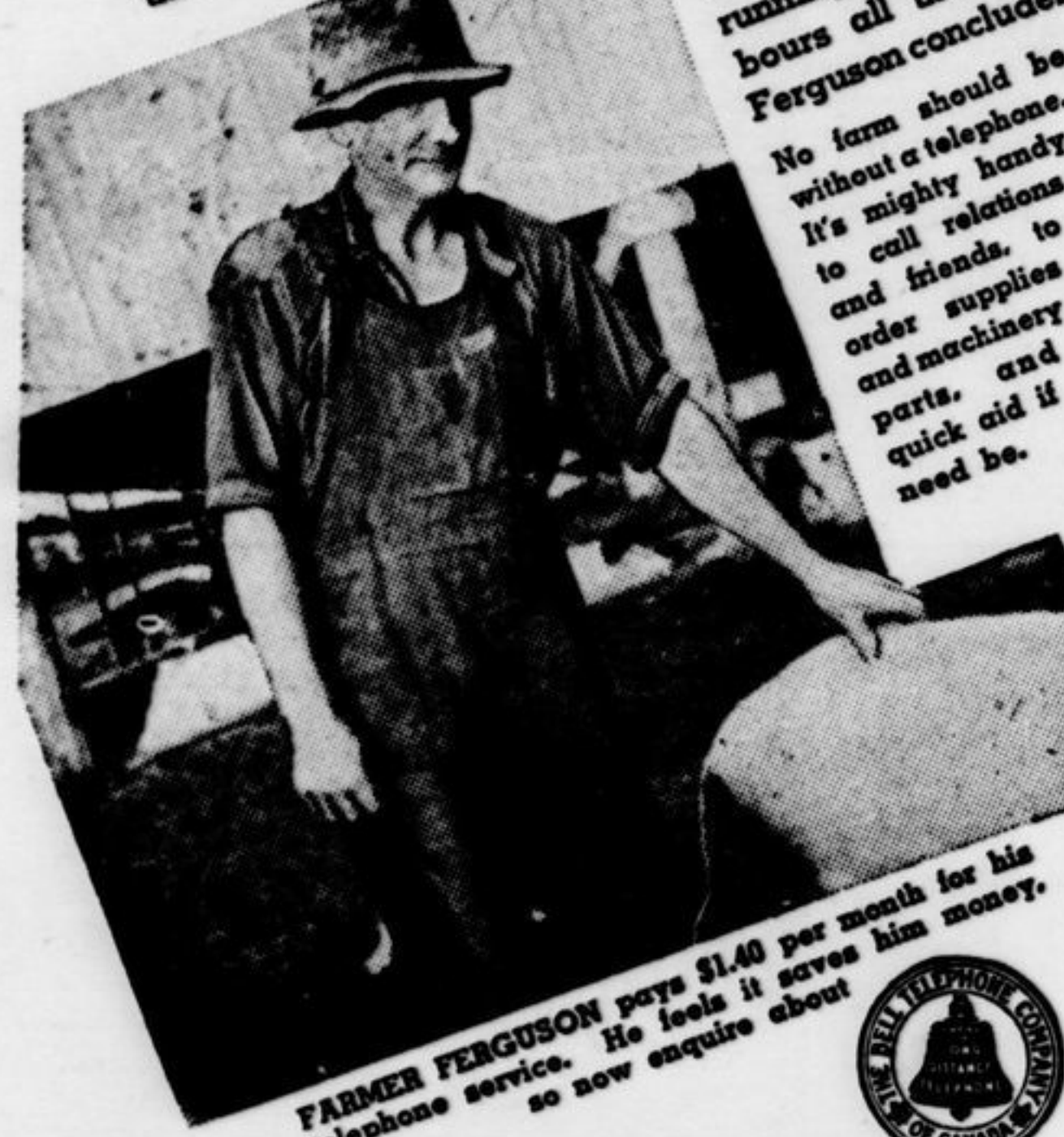
Miss Harriette Wilton attended the Presbyterian Young Peoples' convention held in Harriston on Sunday.
