Grey Presbytery Hears Moderator

Rev. T. M. Murray of Kilsyth chairman of the Grey Presbytery of the Toronto Conference, presided at an adjourned meeting of the Presbytery held in Knox United Church Owen Sound, on Monday afternoon.

Mr. Geo. Scott presented a stirring appeal on behalf of the Foreign Missions committee for mission study and self-sacrificing giving, and recounted the story of a farmer who supported a missionary by his own gift of \$1,250 a year.

Rev. T. Pickering appealed for members to take The Observer, the official church paper, pointing out that its circulation had increased during the last year from 15,000 to 28,000, but that in Grey County there were only 358 subscribers, or one out of every 16 families.

Rev. W. H. Summerell, the new minister at Lamplash, was welcomed by the Presbytery.

The Presbytery voted to sustain the remit from the General Council recommending that two Moderators should be elected, each to serve one year.

Rev. W. H. Smith of Durham presented a comparative report of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund, showing that the Presbytery was \$600 behind in its giving over the same date last year.

Rev. Allan H. Ferry, Knox Church, Owen Sound, introduced a resolution condemning Russia for her ruthless aggression of Finland. The resolution received the sympathetic support of the Presbytery, following a discussion.

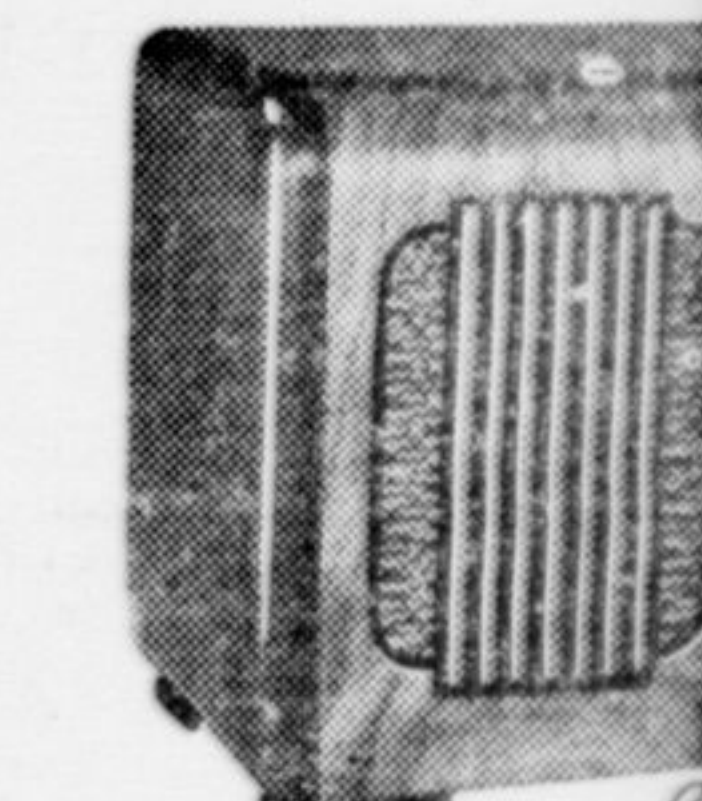
