Coun. McGowan, Fire & Light chairman, stated some necessary equipment had been added for the fire brigade and they had saved some of estimates.

Coun. MacKay, Bd of Works, chairman, tried to satisfy all, but some weren't. It's hard to satisfy everybody. He tried to distribute work as well as possible. If all new heads were returned to Council, taxes may go up to 60 mills.

Coun. McQueen had little else to say, other than Council had a good year.

Chairman Wm. Erwin of the Public School Board stated they would finish year with a balance of \$608 after all expenses paid. What an opportunity people have to give their children an education! He asked co-operation of parents to overcome any difficulties. Come to the Board or the teachers and get them ironed out.

W. H. Kress was satisfied with present council. They had done a splendid job. He appreciated honor of another Mayoralty nomination. It was rather a surprise, and he would take at least 24 hours to think it over.

J. B. Duffield hadn't contemplated running for mayor. It required some consideration.
