"LET'S GO ORIENTAL"

After the holiday season we all feel sort of "fed up" on holiday menus and yet do not feel as if we wish to go back to routine. For those who are of this opinion I offer my recipes for Chop Suey and Chow Mein. I hope you will find these menus appetizing for your

own or for party suppers. If any of you are interested in new ideas for church suppers the Chinese supper serving Chop Sucy is a novelty menu, which is always very popular. If any of you wish some suggestions on this I should be happy to give them to you if you write me your details.

CHOP SUEY

The basic ingredients of this Oriental dish are onions, celery, and the different Chinese sauces which now can be purchased at almost any grocery store. The onions and celery should be fried in peanut or olive oil, or butter will do. Chop Suey should always be served with rice. You may add chicken, pork beef in strips or shrimps, lobsters or oysters. For the finest flavor an addition of sliced water chestnuts, bamboo shoots, mushrooms or almonds toasted will satisfy any palate.

CHINESE CHOP SUEY

2 cups diced raw chicken

2 cups fried pork large onion

cup celery cup mushrooms

2 cups bamboo sprouts 1 cup water chestnuts 3 cups water

2 tablespoons Soy bean sauce Cook chicken and pork in frying

pan until slightly brown. Add the vegetables, cut in thin slices (lengthwise), the water and soy bean sauce. Cook until tender, serve with rice and Soy Bean sauce. Time for cooking 2 hours. Serves eight.

CHOW MEIN

Prepare egg noodle dough according to your own recipe. Cut in thin strips and fry in deep fat, as you would doughnuts and remove when crisp.

Cut a small pork chop and fry with 1/2 cup chopped onion until partly brown. Add Soy Bean sauce and thicken as gravy. Pour over noodles, when hot. Garnish the top with shreds of white meat of chicken and cold ham cut in tooth pick lengths. Pepper steak is made by cooked green peppers instead of celery and beef steak instead of the chicken and in combination used for Chop Suey, also adding mushrooms and water

For a dessert for any of these menus, individual pies made of mincement, apple or pumpkin is usually used. For the beverage remembere the real "China" tea and of course the correct cups, not forgetting the chop sticks, all help to make these suppers a complete

CHICKEN CROQUETTES

This recipe seems to fit in between the holiday festivities and your Chop Suey and as it has been requested I give it here. 1 cup well seasoned cooked

fowl. Use as seasoning salt, pepper, celery salt cayenne and on-

gives quite a distinctive flavor. Moisten with white sauce and cool. Parboil 1 pint of oysters: drain and cover each oyster with chicken mixture. Dip in rolled cracker crumbs and egg; fry in deep fat and drain.

112 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour and gradually onethird cup of oyster liquor and two tablespoons cream. Season with salt and cayenne.

Dates Are Good Value As Food

The food value of dates should not be overlooked in these menuplanning days. Like prunes and figs, the date is a concentrated food, and there is comparatively little waste after the stone has been accounted for. Ordinary dates contain little moisture-only about 20 per cent and sometimes less. Fully two-thirds and even as much as three-quarters of the dates by weight consist of pure food material, the great bulk of it being fruit sugar. Anything from 45 per cent to 50 per cent of the dates consists of pure sugar, which is easily digested and assimilated by the blood and quickly yields energy in the form of warmth and muscular activity. Another good point in favor of dates is the fact that they contain more than a trace of protein, or building material. There are also present various salts as well as vitamins.

Follow Daily Beauty Routine

Among the beauty routines of which a well-known actress approves are: Ice water rinses to close the pores after soap and water cleansing; applying face powder lavishly, letting it set, then whisking off the excess with a soft brush; using rubbing alcohol on shoulders and arms after a bath; whenever possible, washing her face and neck with soap and water during the day as well as night and morning.
