IN DAYS OF YORE

25 YEARS AGO (from Review file, Jan. 14th, 1915) Two accidents this week call attention to an ever present danger in our hilly town. Monday last Royden, son of Mr Robert Burnett, was enjoying the sport of coasting on the steep hill near the Cement Works. A mishap of some kind occurred and the lad came out of it with a cut on his head, requiring several stitches. On Tuesday on Garafraxa St. hill tobogganing was in full blast and one of them with a load of 5 or 6 found themselves in danger of dashing into a cutter that was meeting them. The pilot to save the impact with the cutter tilted the toboggan and in position while sweeping by struck 11-year-old Harry Kress who was clinging to the cutter behind. He received, of course, a violent shock and got a severe cut in one leg, requiring stitching, and some bruises on the feet and elsewhere. Both boys are getting along well.
