Real "Old Bill" Found in Line

By Bairnsfather - Artist Films B.E.F., Sees Walrus Must-

Capt. Bruce Bairnsfather, whose cartoons mirrored the Tommies of the World War, last week was back on the ground where he first immertalized "Old Bill."

But he did not go there with pencil and pad. Captain Bairnsfather was accompanied by a cameraman and two technical assistants to film background scenes of life in the 1939 B.E.F. for a picture to be completed in England by a company of which he is a director.

The picture is to be called "Old Bill and Son."

"I have found few real 'vintage' Old Bills," he said. Busy Beavers Aid Dominion Conservation

Saskatchewan's Department of Natural Resources Is Employing Them to Help Combat Drought - They Conserve Water Supply

Even the busy beaver is being utilized by the Saskacthewan Department of Natural Resources in its program of water conservation in the northern reaches of the Province.

Hundreds of the little animals have been trapped carefully in Southern Saskatchewan and shipped to the north where they are released in streams.

In the south the beaver are not wanted and they cause damage to farm lands when they get busy and dam up streams, leading to the flooding of the lands.

Raises Water Level But in the north because of a long period of drought, stream levels are low. Saskatchewan is known as the greatest duck-breeding grounds in North America but because of low water levels, the duck breeding has dropped to a

This is where the beaver is put to work. Captured in the south, he is transported to the north, released in a stream. The beaver immediately sets to work, builds a dam, thus raising the water level and creating a small pond, even a lake. This water surface forms an inviting area for ducks to nest safely, and with plenty of water.

LESSON II THE PROBLEM OF FORGIVENESS Matthew 18:15-19:30

Golden Text -- "Forgive us our debts, as we also forgive our debtors." Matt. 6:12.

THE LESSON IN ITS SETTING Time - The teaching recorded in chapter 18 was given in the autumn of A.D. 29, All that is recorded in chapter 19 occurred in February and March of the following year, A.D. 30.

Place - All the teaching here recorded in chapter 18 was given in Capernaum. The nineteenth chapter opens in Galilee, but the events of the rest of the chapter are in

KEEP CULLING POULTRY Cull and sill. This process will not only make more room but will also remove a profit destroyer from the poultry flock. There will probably be several pullets that are undersize and not as thrifty as they should be. The surest thing to do is to cull these out with the early molter. As a rule the average farm flock is too crowded and by

giving the birds a thorough culting more room will be available. Then, too, it never pays to keep the "star-boarders" in the flock, nor the undersized birds as they are sure to decrease the income from the flock in more than one

ROOTS AS FEED

While roots are from 80 to 90 percent water, they are a great help in keeping the cow's digestive tract well supplied with this necessity. Chemists have termed them "watered concentrates," because they have in the water present in their natural state some elusive tonic agent that has yet no laboratory label on it. They are food and drink combined. They make just such an appeal to the cow's taste as apples, pears, peaches and other juicy fruits make to the taste of the human being.

A root cellar is just as necessary an equipment of the dairy farm as a sile. Root crops are a benefit to the land, a silage saver, a most excellent cattle feed, and a dairy safety valve.
