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Durham Won 4-3 on Wingham Ice

Contrary to usual hockey form, this Durham Int. hockey team is no home ice club. Rather are they hummer to go on opposition rinks. Recently Wingham held them to a 3-3 tie here, Owen Sound trimmed them 7 to 3 here, but they can now defeat all opposition elsewhere. Their last three games against the other teams in this group on their home ice were all Durham victories: 4-2 in Walkerton, 6-2 in Owen Sound, then on Monday last, 4-3 right in Wingham. Wingham team has shown great improvement recently, but this loss has dropped them to third place from a tie for second with Durham. Trapper Cubs Took Last Game Here

Owen Sound Trapper Cubs earned a 7-3 win over Durham last Friday night on Durham ice, and thereby took a commanding lead for first place in the group. It will now keep Durham busy to nose out the up and coming Wingham crew for second place. The game here Friday night next between these clubs will decide it.

Until the last period Owen Sound had the edge in team play, which combined with Neath's spectacular goal-minding, kept Durham's down-fall. In the 3rd the locals finally broke into Neath's case to count 3, but the visitors tallied as many, to hold their lead of 4 gained in first and second frames. The first string line of Schwan, Bishop, and Williams for Owen Sound had a scoring punch which Durham seemed powerless to offset. Durham had about as many shots on nets, but fozzled them or barged them in Neath's pads.

Schwan scored the only counter in first period, and the visitors made it 4-0 by end of 2nd. Tennant counted on Crawford's assist, and Williams' scored twice, on passes from Bishop, and from Sargeant and Schwan. Durham was covering up loosely, and the Cubs were quick to take advantage of Durham's lapses.

In the third Schwan made it 5-0, on a pretty passing play from Williams and Bishop, then Dean broke the ice for Durham, converting Tucker's pass. Garvie counted No. 6 for the Cubs on passes from Cairns and Tennant, then Durham's only scoring spurge ensued, when Cassidy banged home Dean's pass and Meses counted on G. McDonald's assist. In the final minute, Sargeant then Tennant scored Owen Sound's 7th goal. Whittaker of Arthur handled the game well.

OBITUARY

MISS CHARLOTTE FLETCHER

In Durham hospital on Monday Miss Charlotte Fletcher died after a ten days' illness confined to her bed, although she has for some years suffered from a heart condition. She was only in her 55th year.

She was the second youngest daughter of the late Charles and Catherine Fletcher, and was born on the old homestead on 2nd con, Bentinck. Here she resided all her life until after the death of their brother Alex, when she and her sister Margaret disposed of the farm and stock some four years ago, and removed to Queen St., Durham.

The deceased was a member of Durham Presbyterian Church, formerly of Burns' Church, Rocky Saugeen, and was held in the highest esteem in town and her old home community. She was one of a family of eight, of whom five sisters survive: Mrs. C. McDouall (Julia) and Mrs. A. McKinnon (Cassie) of Calgary, Alta.; Mrs. H. R. Riddell (Mary) of Bentinck; Mrs. F. Wigg (Robena) of Seaford, and Miss Margaret, at home.

Her pastor, Rev. S. W. Hirtle, conducted the funeral service Wednesday amid a large concourse of mourners. Interment was made in Burns' cemetery, Rocky Saugeen.

SUDDEN DEATH OF MRS. ARTHUR McDONALD

It was a shock to Durham and district to learn last Friday of the death of Mrs Arthur McDonald at her home in Acton, after visiting her daughter, Mrs Norman Becker here, only the Sunday previous. She was in apparent good health the day before her death, but Mr McDonald was stunned on arising Friday morning to find his wife lying lifeless in bed.

Medical opinion was that she had died half an hour before from a heart attack.

The deceased was Mary Elizabeth Marshall, only child of the late Andrew and Jeanette Marshall of Durham. She was born in Normanby township fifty-seven years ago where her father died, and when a little girl she moved with her mother to Durham in young womanhood she spent three years on the Review staff, and was united in marriage to Arthur McDonald here thirty-five years ago. Until five years ago they resided continuously in Durham, when Mr McDonald and youngest son Ian bought a Gibson of St. George Anglican bakery business in Acton, and they removed there. Left to deeply mourn are her sorrowing husband, four sons and two daughters: Rowden of Rat Rapids, New Ont.; Willard of Hepworth; Glen of Chatsworth; Ian at home; Mrs Norman Becker (Mrs. of Durham and Mrs Searow (Jean) of Toronto.

The late Mrs McDonald was of a cheerful disposition, kind hearted and ever considerate of others. She was devoted to her family, and had the satisfaction of seeing all well established for themselves. When living here, she was a faithful member of Knox United Church, was an active member of the Ladies' Aid and W. M. S. societies, and was a worker also in Durham Branch Women's Institute.

The funeral service was held at one p. m. Monday at her home in Acton, and the remains brought to Durham cemetery for interment. The cortege reached here at 4.00 p. m., several carloads of friends and relatives accompanying the remains. A large number of Durham friends gathered in the cemetery, where Rev. W. H. Smith conducted the service.

The pallbearers in Durham were: Samuel Wilson, Charles Reay, Wm. Jas. Ritchie, W. D. Erwin, George Becker, William McDonald. At the home in Acton, the Women's Institute members of Acton were flower-bearers.

Knechtel will not Retire in Grey-Bruce

A despatch in several dailies sent from Walkerton, announced that it was rumored that Carl Knechtel of Hanover, Conservative candidate in Grey-Bruce, was withdrawing from the contest, leaving the field to Mr Walter Harris, Liberal, and Miss Macphail, the expected U.P.O. candidate.

Speaking to the Review on Tuesday, Mr Knechtel said "There's nothing whatever to the report. I've no idea where it started, but you may announce that I'm definitely in the fight to the finish, and never considered retiring."

Mr Knechtel is getting his campaign under way and will have more to say later. The Riding Sec'y, for the Conservative party, Mr Brunt of Hanover is ill, and we learn Barrister Glen Rowe, Durham, has been appointed in his place.

Good Year's Business for Shipping Association

The annual meeting of the Durham Farmers' Club and Livestock Shipping Association was held in the Public Library, February 3rd, with a fair attendance of members.

The financial statement showed a \$9,890.59 business, with a total mix of 366 tons of fertilizer, an increase of over 100 tons from previous year. The Club with 140 members is the second largest in Ontario.

Mr Stewart Cooper, Markdale, Miss A. C. Macphail, M. P. of Ceylon and Mr Arthur Haas, Holstein were present and gave some interesting suggestions for the benefit of the Club. It was also stressed by the Manager, that for better service the members should place their orders earlier in the season.

In the Livestock Shipping Division, 1,731 hogs, 1,107 cattle, 501 sheep were shipped during the past year amounting to \$107,316.47. Mr John Grierson was appointed shipper and R. A. Lawson weighmaster for the coming year.

The election of officers were as follows: Pres., Joe Crutchley; Vice Pres., W. A. Lawson, Directors, Tom Hopkins, Herb Edge, George Turnbull, Elgin Wilton, Jas. McGillivray, Fred Torry, William Jacques, Luther Torry, D. J. MacDonalld and Clarence Ross, Mrs S. F. Dargavel, was appointed members' auditor.

Salaries of Town Officials Raised

Probably the most important business before the Durham Council Monday night was the passing of bylaws increasing salaries of town employees. Councillor Duffield mentioned at last meeting that he thought them insufficient and asked that consideration be given and bylaws introduced next meeting.

A motion was made that Constable Scott's salary be increased from \$60 to \$75 per month. Mayor Bell moved in amendment that \$75.00 be monthly salary with duties as assessor included, for which Mr Scott receives \$85 extra. As assessing is covered under another bylaw, amendment was changed to read "salary of \$68 per month" without assessing included. Coun. Macdonald seconded the amendment stating he thought it a fair increase, and as good a wages many factory employees received for no harder work on amendment being put, it was lost 5 to 2, and the motion of \$75 a month, carried. The new salary is to commence January 1, 1940.

The salary of Clerk-Treasurer B. H. Willis was increased from \$70 to \$75 per month unanimously, and incorporated in bylaw. Reg. Steeds having resigned as auditor the other auditor, Jas. P. Sullivan, was appointed as sole auditor at double salary \$100 a year, payable each 3 months upon satisfactory completion of the audit.

Two applications were in for carrying town liability insurance—from C. M. Elvidge and Don. McQueen. This insurance will cost about \$188 per year. Before buying such Council asked to have a sample of policy forwarded, that they might know just coverage they will be getting. An application to hold a Tag Day for the Blind, on Durham Streets on May 14th next, was granted.

General accounts totalling 3,103.52 were passed, including \$2450 hydrant rentals; also \$135.50 January relief account.

The I. O. D. E. Society was granted free use of Town Hall for the present year. Application by Junior Red Cross for reduction in rent was left with Property Com. Communications from Ontario Federation of Mayors, Ont. Good Roads Association, Hospital for Sick Children, and Salvation Army rescue work, asking for membership fees and grants, were all ordered filed. Reeve Hunter explained the County is giving an increased grant this year to the Salvation Army to cover all municipalities.

The Auditors' Report for 1939 was received and accepted. It showed \$57,619.74 of 1939 taxes paid in 1939, and \$4191.35 unpaid, besides \$725.36 Pavement and Sewer taxes unpaid. Arrears of taxes previous to 1939 amount to \$6587.70.

New High School equipment installed during the past year, for Shop Work and Domestic Science courses, cost \$4185.87, of which the Government gives a grant of half the amount.

A discussion of Relief problems followed Council session. Three or four more applications for help were granted.

Chesley Enterprise Changes Hands

After being in the McDonald family for nearly 45 years, the Chesley Enterprise has been sold to Mr Clayton Schaus of the Hanover Post, who takes possession next Monday. Mr Schaus has been on the Post staff for over twenty years, and is a fluent writer. The late Wm. McDonald bought the Enterprise in 1892, and he impressed his strong personality into the columns of his paper. In recent years, his son, John C. McDonald, has been in partnership, and has conducted the paper since his father's death a year ago.
