IN DAYS OF YORE

25 YEARS AGO

(from Review file, Feb. 18th 1915) While driving to church on Sunday morning, Mrs John Bell noticed a purse lying on the road on Lambton street east, and found it contained money and other articles. She gave it into the hands of Constable Arrowsmith, who learned the owner to be Miss Millie Whitmore, teacher at Lamash, she having dropped it going home the evening previous.

While renovating the cells in the local lock-up last week, Constable Arrowsmith made rather an unexpected find. Concealed in the mattress, he pulled out a repeating revolver, unloaded however.

North-East Normanby: There passed peacefully away at his home in Normanby on Saturday last, another of the old pioneers of that township in the person of Mr James Ferguson. Mr Ferguson was born in the County of Wellington near Guelph in 1835.

A new speaker, a new Parliament, a new Lieut-Governor and a new Premier, made a combination of new things rarely or never seen before at the opening of the Legislature.

The important news in Canada these days is once again the news that for good and sufficient reasons cannot have a big play in the press of the country at the moment. But no censorship regulations are broken when we report that an intense development of air training for young men across the Dominion.

Many of the various school announced at Ottawa when details of the Empire Air Training scheme were formally publicized are now in operation, and the skill of pilots in training, observers, gunners and groundsmen is increasing daily.

It will come as good news in these days of war stress, that the Ontario Government is prepared to continue the existing basis of relief contributions to municipalities.

The present agreement with Ottawa provides for the payment of 40% by the Dominion, 40% by the province and 20% by the municipalities—the province reserving the right to establish monthly quotas for relief by any municipality. It is announced that during 1939, Ontario municipalities have been saved about \$800,000 by the province's arrangement in with Ottawa.

COST OF BELL INQUEST

IRKS SIMCOE COUNTY

Simcoe County Council at its closing session last week, with special reference to the inquest at Collingwood into the deaths of Mr and Mrs Warren G. Bell at Wasaga Beach last autumn, took strong exception to the increasing cost of administration of justice in the County.

In his report to Council on County finances, County Treasurer Coleman pointed out that a "glaring example" of extravagance in the administration of justice was the Bell Inquest which cost the County of Simcoe about \$900, including about \$525 witness fees.

The County Treasurer said he understood Miss Small had brought 45 witnesses to Collingwood and now wanted the County to pay them. "Why extra lawyers and extra coroners and all these experts?" the Treasurer asked. One expert, he said, had cost the County \$70.
