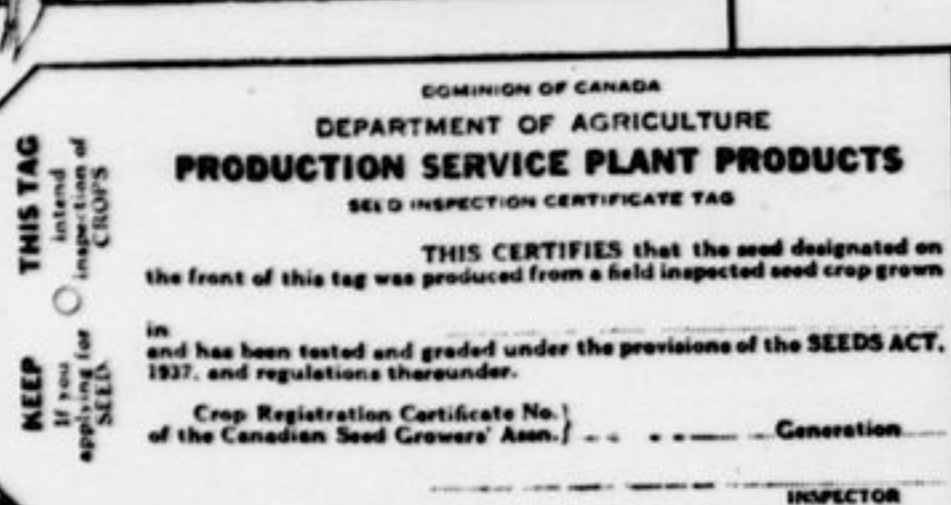

ALLAN MCGILLIVRAY

Death came to Mr Allan McGillivray, Friday, Feb. 2, as a quiet interlude in a long and useful life. He was in his 86th year, having been born in Halton County in 1854. Of pioneer stock he moved with his parents to lot 19 con. 14 Egremont in 1855. Here he resided until he purchased lot 18 con 13. In January 1895, he married Margaret McEachern, Minto Township. To this union were born two sons, Roy of Moffat and John on the home place, who with one brother Malcolm and 12 grandchildren mourn his passing.

Mr McGillivray was of a retiring nature. His home and family being his chief interest. He was of Scotch descent, a staunch Presbyterian and a member of Fairbairn Church.

The funeral was held from his late residence on Monday Feb. 5th, at 1.30 o'clock. His Pastor, Rev. W. Johnston read the 50th Psalm and spoke at the house and graveside in Reid's cemetery. Two hymns 'The Lord's my Shepherd' and 'Abide with Me', were sung. The pallbearers were James F. McEachern, John McGillivray, Percy McEachern, (nephew) Harrison, Peter McEachern, Alex. Calder and Glad. McInnis. Russel Nelson acted as flower bearer and carried a floral spray from grandchildren, Moffat.

A gathering of neighbors showed the high esteem in which Mr McGillivray was held. Mr. Johnston spoke of Mr. McGillivray's sterling qualities. He was a good father, a kind friend and a good neighbor. 'He fought a good fight and finished the course.'

At start of second, it was safer when G. McDonald in front of nets took G. McGillivray's pass to make it 5-2, then the locals troubles began. McDonald, former netminder, got into harness and held forth the rest of the night. Wingham added one, then Moses, who had been irritated by Bateson's butt-ending slashed at him, and drew a match penalty while Bateson drew 2 minutes. With Durham a man short for 10 min., Wingham scored twice and tied up the game, 5-5, by end of second frame.

In final frame Durham went to town, scoring 5 to 1, though having only a slight margin on the play. Dean with 5 goals was Durham's leading sniper, with Cassidy, G. McDonald and G. McGillivray also outstanding. Proctor, who scored 4 of Wingham's 6, was the visitors' star.

Where the Enemy Planes Distract

The following extract from a letter received by Miss Ina Milne of Toronto from her cousin in Peterhead, Scotland, gives a glimpse of fearsome war conditions there. Peterhead is the extreme easterly city in Scotland:

'John had difficulty in getting back to the Shetland Isles after Christmas holidays. The plane service was cancelled the day John was due to return. We think this was due to an air raid in the Orkneys, consequently he had to wait for a steamer and on account of trouble in the North Sea there was no boat for a whole week. However he reached his destination yesterday and we were all pleased to have his wire saying he had arrived safely.'

Yesterday an Aberdeen trawler came into our harbor simply riddled with machine gun bullets and one of the men had gone insane. Twice crews of mined boats were rescued by our life boat. They were brought to the hospital here. Although we are not classed as a valuable area, we have had more action than most places.

A week past Saturday 3 Nazi planes circled Peterhead, the 'swastikas' were clearly visible. This was the first time I had seen German planes, but it is by no means their first visit.

When I was in the Nursing Home in October having my appendix removed, the blackout conditions were rather depressing. I had my 'tummy' dressed by the light of a 'spot torch.' Previous to my operations I was taken in at midnight, an awkward time of course. The following night 'Lord Haw Haw' announced that he was going to blow Aberdeen to granite chips. So I wasn't too happy lying wide awake and hearing the planes roar, nothing happened, but it was nerve wracking.

Dad is busy converting drifters into hospital and casualty ships. I was doing my bit as an Ambulance Driver, part time, but after the operation this had to be given up. Soon I will enlist in the local V. A. D. centre.

It is really dreadful times and I wish it were all over.'

MRS. AARON VOLLETT PASSES IN TORONTO

Word has been received that Mrs Aaron Vollett died in Toronto on Wednesday. Mrs Vollett was well-known in Durham and vicinity. She is a native of Durham, her maiden name being Nancy Ann Douglas. Her first husband was Mr Maidment, and they resided in Markdale. He died in 1873, and she was left with three children, Roy, Ross and Jean, the latter dying suddenly a few years ago, and she is survived by Mrs Ray Smith and Mrs Ross Moore, both in Toronto.

After her marriage to Norman Vollett they resided in Normanby and soon after his death in 1922 Mrs Vollett moved to Toronto, where she has since resided.

A service was held at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Smith, at 56 Garnet Ave., Toronto, on Thursday evening and interment was in Markdale cemetery.
