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## Owen Sound Cubs Eliminate Durham

Winning 6 to 5 on their own ice Monday night, Owen Sound Trapper Cubs captured the group championship from Durham by 13 to 9 on the record. The game was fast in spots, but not until the last frame did Durham put up the argument of which they are capable. The Cubs ran a 3-0 lead in first while blanking Durham, then scored 2 to 1 in second. When the last period was minutes gone, the Cubs added their last goal, making it 6 to 1 on the game. It was then Durham really forced the play, confining action mainly inside the home team's blue line. Their aggressive last frame stand produced 4 goals, but the rally fell 1 short of overcoming the big early lead of the hōmesters.

Though the Sounders are a fast-skating, fast-breaking crew, and are always dangerous, they are not invincible, and we still believe that Durham can take their measure when the locals decide to play aggressive hockey the whole game, and not part of the time. Cassidy was a standout for the locals, blocking many dangerous attacks and also aiding in two Durham goals. Tucker and O. McDonald were also prominent in the play, while Schwan and Williams of the Cubs first string forward line were their most effective men. Kuntz of Kitchener again refereed satisfactorily.

We wish the Trapper Cubs success in the quest for further honors in the semi-finals. Their first opponents will probably be the winners of Paisley—Lucknow playoff. While they should win this round, we doubt if the Cubs or Durham could proceed much further in the play-downs. There are many strong Int. B. teams down south.

## Cubs Won First Game, 7-4

Durham put in their best efforts on the start, with Dean scoring from Tucker's pass in just 1 1/2 min. and Bishop trying it up 1/4 minute later. Sneezy hockey prevailed, O. **MRS. LLOYD MILLER**  
Relatives and friends here were saddened to learn last Wednesday of the death of Mrs. Lloyd Miller, a former Glenelg and Durham girl, at her home in Windsor, in her 58th year. The deceased, who was formerly Jewel McComb, a daughter of the late Mr and Mrs Sam McComb, was here for a few weeks at New Year's, coming to nurse the late John Burgess. Mr Burgess lived only a day after her arrival and she and daughter Elen remained a month with her cousin, Mrs Burgess in the latter's bereavement. The Miller family had just been nicely settled in their new home in Windsor, when on Friday, Feb. 9th, Mrs Miller took ill from a heart condition, and survived only for five days after.

The deceased lady was an apparently healthy woman, a cheerful personality, and an excellent homemaker and mother. She will be sorely missed by the bereaved husband and two daughters, Elen who will be home with her father, and Ruth, nurse-in-training in Brantford hospital.

The deceased was born in Glenelg township, but in her girlhood days, the family moved to Durham, where she attended Public and High School. In young womanhood, she entered training for a nurse in Brantford hospital, securing her R. N. degree. About twenty-eight years ago she was wedded to Lloyd Miller of Brantford, and they took up home-making in that city. Several years ago Mrs Miller returned to the parental home here to nurse mother in her last illness, and remained in Durham for four or five years caring for her father. Since then Mrs Miller and daughter Elen lived at the home here until, and later to Windsor.

Besides the sorrowing husband and daughters, one brother and two sisters survive: Allie of Brantford; Mrs Fred Forsyth (Reta) of Alton; Mrs Rev. Jas. Moore (Gertrude) of Shakespeare.

The funeral service took place at Mr Miller's old home, 50 Dundas St., Brantford, on Friday last, and interment was made in Brantford cemetery.

Attending the funeral from Durham were Mayor Allan Bell and Mrs Bell, and three cousins of the deceased: Mr Grant and Miss Leah McComb and Mrs John Burgess.

### MRS. THOS. COLERIDGE

The death of Mrs. Thos. Coleridge of London, Ont. (nee Emma T. Green) occurred suddenly at her residence there on Tuesday, Feb. 13th, and interment was made in Mount Pleasant cemetery, London, on Friday, the 16th.

The late Mrs Coleridge's husband, Thos. Coleridge, barrister, who died in London in 1907, was a former "Extremont" resident, a brother of the late Mrs Charles Ramage of

### Over 14,000 Library Books Read in 1939

Durham Public Library Board held its annual meeting recently, when Rev. W. H. Smith and G. C. Webster were re-appointed chairman and secy-treasurer. Mr Webster was reappointed to the Board by the School Board and Mr Chas Moffat by the Town Council.

The librarian's report showed that \$475.95 had been spent on books of this \$188.95 was spent for books of fiction, \$136.99 for juvenile, \$150.11 for non-fiction. There was a circulation of 14,427 books in 1939; 3,264 fiction, 4,568 juvenile and 1,595 non-fiction. The number of borrowers increased from 769 to 778 and the 168 were juveniles. There are 42 per cent of town citizens using the library which is an increase of four per cent over previous years. The circulation per borrower is nineteen books.

During the year the library was visited by the three senior rooms and their teachers in the Public School and the students were given questionnaires by their teachers, and they had to find the answer and as well in what class of books the answer was found and where arranged in the library.

This new year the teachers of the Public School each take ten books from the library to class-room for a limited time to aid the pupils in a good choice of reading. All pupils this year enter the reading contest sponsored by the Canadian Grey-Chapter of the I.O.D.E. Some of the rural schools are also using the library on the same basis with the exception they have a fee of 25 cents for three months. The past year found a box of discard books being sent to a Durham native, Alton McLean, teaching on Manitoulin Island.

The Anglican Young Peoples' Association held a skating party on Thursday evening with over one hundred skaters present. The Durham band was in attendance.

On Tuesday evening, February 13th, Durham Presbyterian Church held its annual meeting. The basement was well filled with a representative gathering from both town and country and after the singing of a hymn and opening prayer the business of the evening got under way, moving briskly on under the chairmanship of the pastor Rev. S. W. Hirtle. The financial standing indicated progress as sufficient funds were on hand to liquidate all debts and meet all obligations of the church and leave a fair balance. Besides this new equipment had been added to kitchen and church had been given on the outside a new coat of paint. For these improvements the Ladies' Aid, the Young Women's Organization and Mr Gordon Greenwood who gave services free are to be thanked.

In the religious work of the church the regular two diets of worship have been held each Sabbath of the year. At these able sermons showing much thought have been preached by the pastor and although the attendance, especially at the morning service has been fair, yet there is considerable room for improvement. If our national life is to be uplifted as it needs to be in this hour of crisis the uplift should begin in the individual. Can we not therefore have a full co-operation of spirit and effort not only at Divine worship on the Lord's Day but at all our church functions as well? At the Sabbath services able assistance is rendered by the choir than which there is no more faithful body of workers. Weekly prayer meetings held in the homes continue to be a feature of the work.
