LAST-MINUTE RUSH ROOMS FOR DRIVERS

March 31st is Set as Deadline for 1939 Plates and Licenses

No extension of time will be granted beyond March 31 for use of the 1939 plates and licenses.

In making this announcement, J. P. Bickell, Registrar of Motor Vehicles urged all motorists to secure their permits and licenses immediately.

While many car owners throughout the province have already secured their new 1940 plates, records show that there are thousands who face the prospect of finding themselves in the last-minute rush unless they act without delay.

Officials at the Motor Vehicles Branch declare that the motoring public could easily avert the inconvenience of waiting in a crowd.

"It's a job that will take a few minutes now but it may take hours later on," one official stated. "We have the plates and licenses ready; it's now up to the motorists, but March 31st is positively the deadline."
