
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

In the opinion of the Board the picture is capable of being used-and is, in fact, presently being used in Canada - not for purposes of entertainment or education but for political propaganda. The showing of the pictures would have been to the undoubted advantage of the Liberal

Government which was opposing C.I.O. activities in Ontario. Yet the Ontario Liberal Government banned the exhibition of the films and pictures.
