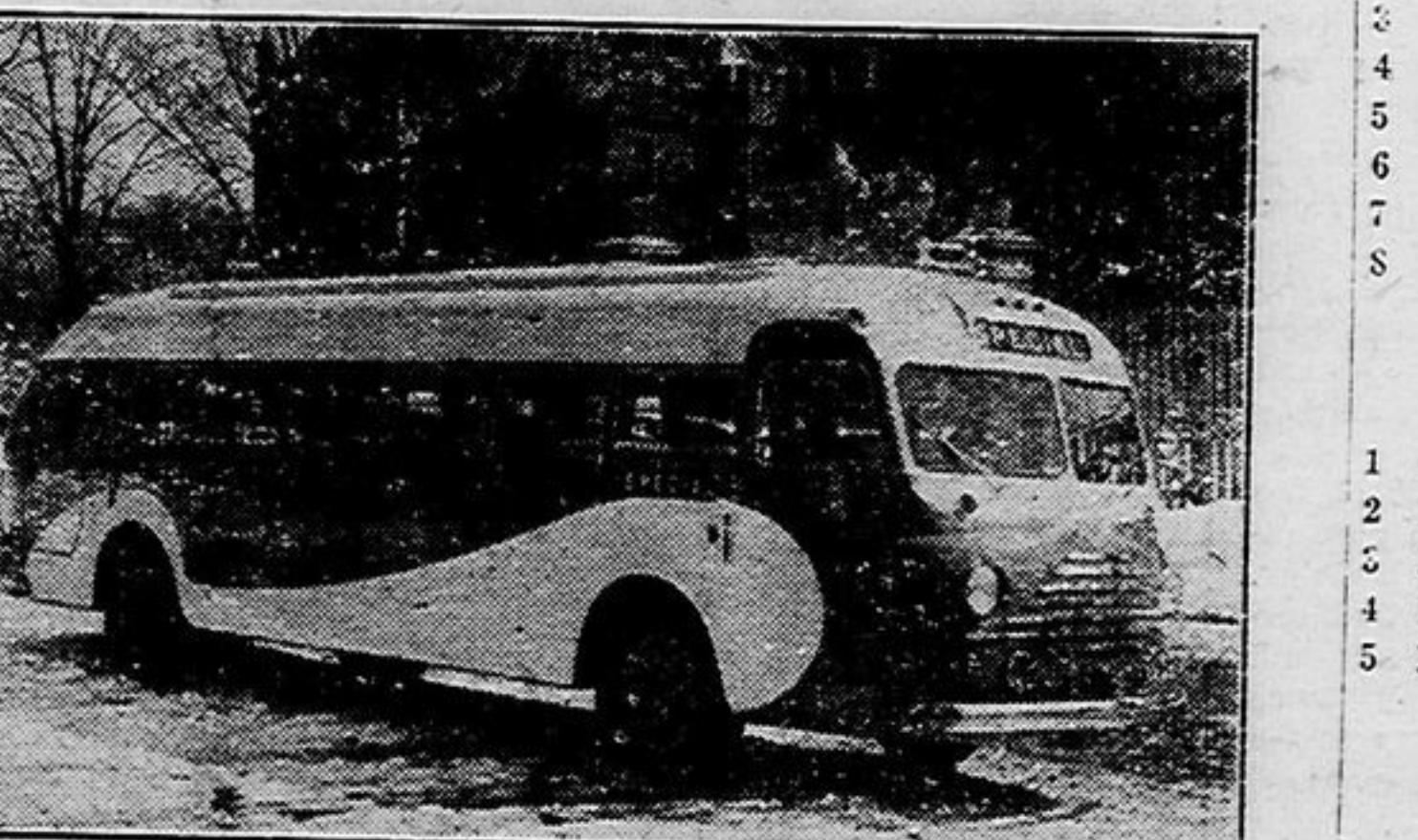

The purchase of four 1940 model "Highway Clipper" motor coaches and the inauguration of "Highway Clipper" service between Guelph and Owen Sound is announced to-day by Gray Coach Lines.

This is the second group of new coaches to be placed in service so far this year in accordance with the company's policy of providing the most modern equipment for its patrons.

The "Highway Clippers" are graceful, streamlined coaches of the engine-in-rear design. This arrangement eliminates all noise and vibration and brings new pleasure to bus travellers. The interiors are attractively finished in blue and white with chrome metal fittings. The deeply upholstered individual chairs are nicely cushioned with sponge rubber and are adjustable to several comfortable positions. There is plenty of leg room between the seats which are set well above aisle level where tall passengers may easily stand erect. Large interior baggage racks accommodate ordinary luggage and a spacious weatherproof compartment is available at the rear of the coach for heavier pieces. The latest draft-proof ventilation system and three hot water heaters assure comfort at all seasons.

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Hikers Take The Sky Line Trail



Peter Whyte, prominent Banff artist whose paintings grace many drawing rooms in Canada and the United States, will lead the Sky Line Trail Hikers of the Canadian Rockies on a most interesting four-day holiday this year to Larch Valley near beautiful Moraine Lake and the Valley of the Ten Peaks. Plans have been completed for the annual outing, from August 8 to 12, of this unique organization which seeks out the loveliest spots in the Canadian Rockies and spends four healthy, happy days on Sham's mare touring the valleys, alpine meadows, and rocky country above the timberline. While hiking is a popular all-summer sport at Banff Springs Hotels and Chateau Lake Louise, the Trail Hikers goes credit for popularizing beauty spots off the beaten trails. Like explorers of old, they comb the country for vantage points to witness a spectacular sunset or sunrise, for camera shots to take back home as trophies, and for lakes where the trout bite freely. With a central camp in Larch Valley, the Skyline Trail Hikers of the Canadian Rockies will spend their official four-day outing in leisurely fashion through this particularly interesting section of the Rockies. On the closing evening they will have a pow-wow and election of officers.
