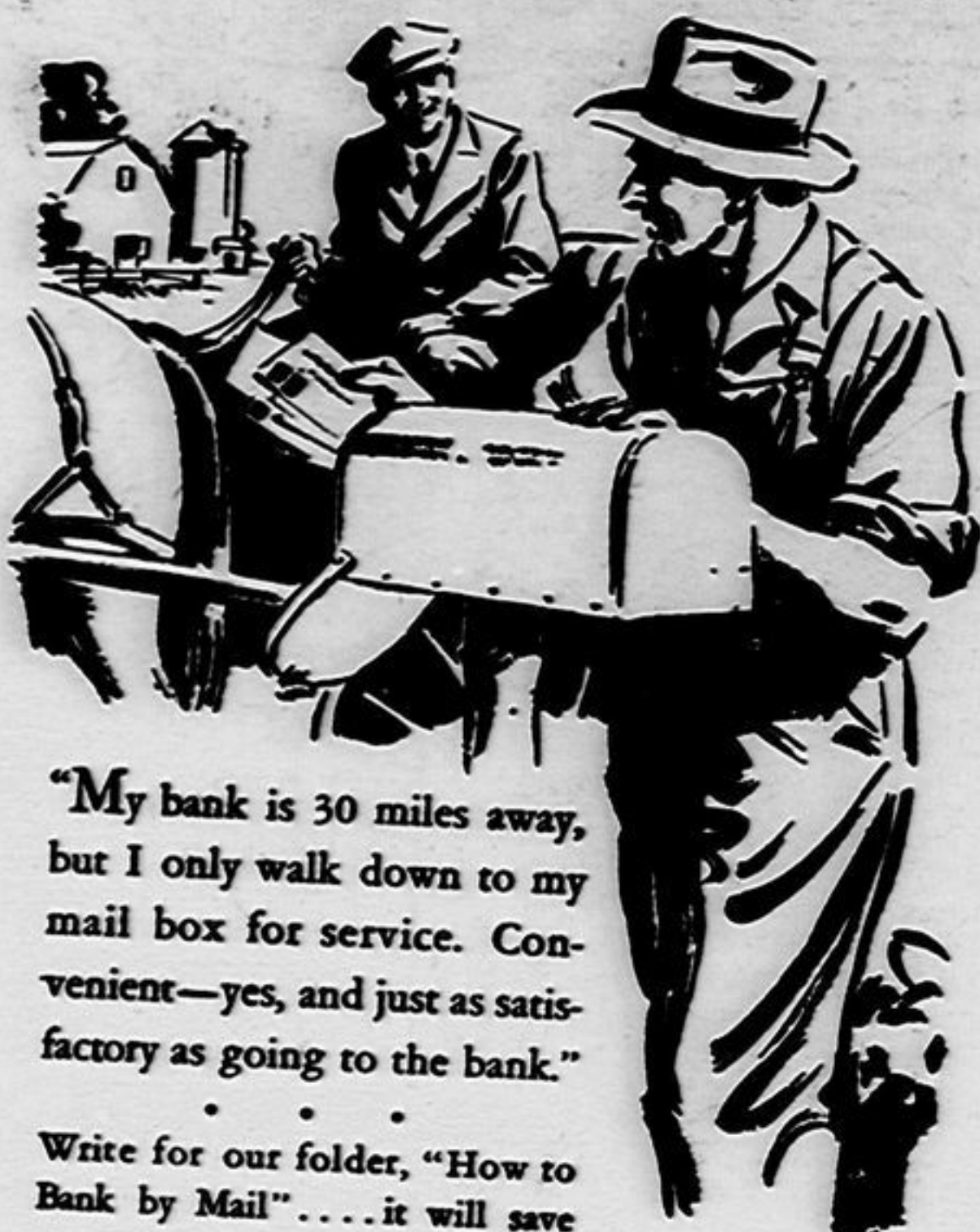

OBITUARY

MRS. MATTHEW BARBER

As the result of a paralytic stroke the previous day, Mrs. Matthew Barber died last Saturday morning in her seventy-ninth year, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John McMillan in Holstein, with whom she had spent the winter. She has been in frail health recently, but was always able to be around.

The late Mrs Barber was widely known and highly esteemed, having since her marriage fifty-five years ago last Christmas day resided near Barber's Corners, about five miles south of Durham. She was formerly Esther Bull, the last member of the family of the late Mr and Mrs Henry Bull, and was born in Bentinck near Vickers on Jan. 12 1862. She attended No. 3 school there, and later learned dressmaking, spending several years at it before her marriage to Matthew Barber in 1884, performed by the late Rev. Wm. Park.

They began homemaking on the farm on Normanby side now owned by their son Harold, and after thirty years there, bought the former Geo. Neil and Jas. McIlvride farm across No. 6 Highway, now owned by their son Cecil, which has since been her home. Her husband predeceased her in 1936. Two daughters and two sons survive: Mrs. Wm. Allan (Ida) of Egremont; Mrs. John McMillan (Jennie) of Holstein; Harold and Cecil on the home farms.

Five years ago the golden wedding anniversary was joyously celebrated.

The deceased lady was of a quiet, refined disposition, a loyal wife and mother and an ideal neighbor to the community. She was a faithful member of Knox, Normanby Presbyterian Church. Her pastor Rev. H. Kay conducted the funeral service Monday afternoon from Mrs. McMillan's home, in Holstein, taking as his text, "I have fought a good fight, W. Johnston of Holstein assisted in the service.

The pall bearers were old neighbors: R. R. Watson, Robt. Carmount, John and Harry Wilkinson, Palmer Patterson, Norman Schenk who laid the remains to rest in Maplewood cemetery. Five grand children bore the floral tokens: William and Islay Barber, John Allan Frank and Bert Gadd.

WILLIAM L. KERR

There passed away on the 17th of April at his home in Grand Rapids, Michigan, William L. Kerr after an illness of a few weeks from heart trouble. He was in his eighty-second year and the eldest son of the late James and Jane McCreie Kerr of Hampden Normanby Tp.

Mr Kerr was born on the farm now owned by Mr Samuel Koenig; and it was there he spent the first twenty years of his life, and here he formed many friendships that remained during lifetime. With the exception of one year in Durham with the late Robert Hill, contractor, the remainder of his life was spent in the United States in Detroit and Saginaw, but mostly in Grand Rapids where he was for many years train despatcher at the roundhouse of the Pierre-Marquette Railway of Grand Rapids and was a few years ago superannuated.

Mr Kerr was married on the 25th of December 1885 to Miss Jennie Farris, a daughter of a Sarnia Tp. farmer. They lived to celebrate their golden wedding on the same date 1935. A few months later four years ago his wife passed away.

Their family consisted of two sons. James, the oldest, has been a professor in the college at Naperville, Illinois for a number of years; Kenneth is an Inspector of Dairies at Grand Rapids. There are two grand children. Others left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving relative are one brother John Kerr near Vane, the last of a one time happy family of four. An only sister Margaret (Mrs Derby) died many years ago and his youngest brother James Kerr fifteen years past.

There are a number of nephews and nieces in this locality who will long have pleasant memories of their uncle, William Kerr.

Mr Kerr was a consistent member of the Presbyterian Church for many years and also belonged to the Masonic Order but never sought publicity in municipal or political affairs.
