To this union there are two daughters and two sons: Walter of Melancthon; Mrs. Walter Stewart (Mary) of Hopeville; Miss Sadie and James at home. Mrs. Black is deceased several years. The family and one sister, Mrs. Henrietta Wright of Rockwood, are chief mourners. There are numerous nieces, nephews and other friends, with all of whom this community sympathizes at this time.

Employment Con itio Better in Grey

Graduates of Collegiate Institutes and of secondary schools in Grey and Bruce Counties will this summer enjoy the best prospects to face graduating classes in years. Arthur Kreutzweiser, manager of the Ontario Government Office of the Employment Service of Canada in Owen Sound, is authority for that statement. He reports a brisk demand in recent weeks for younger people of both sexes. The Owen Sound office, which serves both Grey and Bruce Counties, would welcome further registration of young people and if the present trend is maintained boys and girls leaving school this summer will find it easier to obtain jobs than for many years past.

The demand for inexperienced help, beginners, has not been confined to any particular line. Office workers, retail store help and the various trades have all shown an interest in recent weeks in acquiring young men and women just starting out to earn their own living.

Amongst the older people, the demand for skilled labor continues and many semi-skilled persons are finding work. There has, however, been no increase in the demand for common laborers, beyond seasonal increase always noticeable in the spring.

There will definitely be a shortage of farm help this year. Mr. Kreutzweiser reports. The demand for farm laborers has been maintained fairly well. A few workers in this classification are still seeking employment and there are a few jobs, those in which the pay is low, still unfilled. Mr. Kreutzweiser believes that an increase in the use of tractors may prevent any great increase in the demand for help until the haying season, but later, there is certain to be a shortage of help not merely in this district but throughout the province.

Tenders should be made on the forms supplied by the Department and in accordance with departmental specifications and conditions thereto. When the amount of a tender exceeds the sum of \$5000.00—whether it be for one building only or more—the tenderers must attach to their tender a certified cheque on a chartered bank in Canada, made payable to the order of the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the tender, or Bearer Bonds of the Dominion of Canada, or of the Canadian National Railway and its constituent companies, unconditionally guaranteed as to principal and interest by the Dominion of Canada, or the aforementioned bonds and a certified cheque of Susan Winter's Inspiring Gifted Cheque, if required to make up an odd amount.

The Department also reserves the right to demand from any successful tenderer a security deposit, in the form of a certified cheque or bond as above equal to 10 per cent. of the amount of his bid to guarantee the proper fulfillment of the contract. 25 YEARS AGO

(From Review file, May 13th, 1915) The annual meeting of the Durham Branch of the Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs Jas. Hepburn on Thursday last, over 30 ladies were present. The following officers were elected: Pres., Mrs N. McCannel; 1st Vice Pres., Mrs T. McNulty; 2nd Vice Pres., Mrs J. S. McElraith; Sec'y-Treas., Miss Margaret McGirr; District Director, Mrs. M. H. Knechtel; Directors, Mrs C. Ramage, Mrs S. Patterson.

Edge Hill corr: Mrs. Robt. Ector had a fine new piano placed in her home last week.

The Presbyterian Church with the largest auditorium in the town was filled to overflowing on Sunday evening last, by an earnest worshipping people of all denominations, met to recognize the passing of gallant young Canadians on the battle field of battle, while in service of their country and in our stead. It was estimated that between 500 and 600 were present.

Mr Chas Petty last Saturday came within hearing of some disloyal utterances of a Glenelg man of German descent, and resented it vigorously. The other party and others so inclined had better whisper pro-German views to the winds in this neck of the woods.

The great Cunard Liner, Lusitania sailed from New York with a passenger list of 1500 and a crew of 600. All went well till, when off the south coast of Ireland not far from Queens-town on Friday last, one of the German submarine horrors, sent two torpedoes into the sides of the great vessel and all went wrong. In spite of bulk heads, double bottoms and other devices the great liner began to sink and in 18 minutes she was gone. She gave a lurch forward, and prevented use of many of the boats and as a consequence the toll of death amounts to over 1300 souls, the list at last accounts being 784.
