**SHOULD HAVE AIRFIELD
CLOSE TO TOWN**

A Camp Borden aviator made a forced landing just north of Durham Monday afternoon, fortunately without injury to himself, and little damage to his large plane. He had circled over town and district for an hour or so, endeavouring to locate a suitable field, finally choosing the large front field on Geo. Noble's farm alongside the highway.

Planes frequently make training flights in this direction from Borden, and Durham being about 50 miles due west from this air camp, would be a proper place to have a recognized landing field, with another 46 miles further west near Kincaid on the lake shore. The Government might lease a suitable field for planes landing and take-off when necessary, at small expense for two or three years. Such a field would be a benefit to the town, and a known place of safety for any plane in difficulty.

**HOLLAND SURRENDERS:
ALLIED LINE HOLDING**

Germany last Friday violated her solemn promises to Holland and Belgium to respect their neutrality, and in five days, overrun and conquered the Dutch nation, except for one province, slaughtered 100,000 men or a quarter of her army, and forced its surrender, to avoid complete destruction of its army and its big cities. And again sabotage and treachery aided in its downfall. Strong Allied aid could not arrive in time to save the country, but the British and French, with their backs to the wall are heavily reinforcing the Belgians and have stopped the German drive, temporarily at least, and are attempting to hold about half of Belgium. History's greatest battles are in progress, the situation is crucial, but all civilized Christian nations pray that the Allied outlook may soon brighten, and the German threat to invade France and Britain be effectually quelled.
