

## Furniture And Its Arrangement

These Are A Few General Rules to Learn With Regard To Proper Grouping in the Rooms of Your Home

There are a few general rules regarding the arrangement of furniture, and they apply as readily to a room in which the furniture has not changed its position for years as they do to a new house with completely new furnishings.

**GANGWAYS NEEDED**

There must be clear passageways to every door, for it is uncomfortable to be required to navigate all around a chair or table when entering or leaving the room. Also there should be two good "thoroughfares" across the room, so that one may walk in a straight path without dodging about or bumping into the corner of something in an awkward fashion.

If there is a fireplace with a group of chairs or couch on either side of it, the floor space between them must be clear and empty, and also for some distance in front of the fire. If a sofa is placed facing the fire, there must be some space between it and the fire, and there must also be a clear passageway around each end of the sofa.

**SIMPLE RULE FOR CHAIRS**

There are many kinds of variations in groupings which can be worked out, but a simple rule to follow is that no chair which is provided as a place for a person to sit on for any length of time (not side chairs, or chairs in dining-rooms or halls) should be without a convenient table for a book, teacup, or ash tray.

## Norway and Canada

The truth is that while Canadians know something about snow, they know very little about the Arctic regions, says the Vancouver Province. And Norway knows a great deal. All of Norway is north of 58 degrees, and there are hardly any communities in Canada so far north. Dawson is only at 64. Labrador is nearly all farther south than any of Norway. We look upon Juneau as pretty far up the coast, but Juneau is miles farther south than Oslo, Narvik, the little iron ore port, scene of important engagements between British and Germans within the past month, is far within the Arctic Circle, somewhere about latitude 69—as far north as Coronation Gulf or the mouth of the Mackenzie, and considerably farther north than Iceland.

So many refugees from the battle areas have flooded into French and British centres that the Allies are faced with a serious problem in looking after them.

## More For Beauty Than On Teeth

Educating people to go to the dentist when their teeth are defective is an important need of the future, Dr. Arthur Merritt told the Ontario Dental Association in a convention at Toronto. Despite a century of great progress in dentistry, dental ills have not been materially reduced, he said, adding that almost no progress has been made toward their prevention.

**99.37 ARE DEFECTIVE**

The fact that 99.3 per cent. of 3,450 children examined in the U.S. 12 and under, had decaying teeth, constituted a challenge to the profession, he said. In the U.S.A., he declared, the public pays annually almost twice as much for cosmetics as it does for dental care, and \$200,000,000 more annually for tobacco than for medical and dental care combined.

LESSON XI  
HAGGAI URGES THE BUILDING OF GOD'S HOUSE

Printed Text, Hag. 1:2-12  
Golden Text — "Let us consider one another to provoke unto love and good works, not forsaking our own assembling together, as the custom of some is. Heb. 10:24, 25."

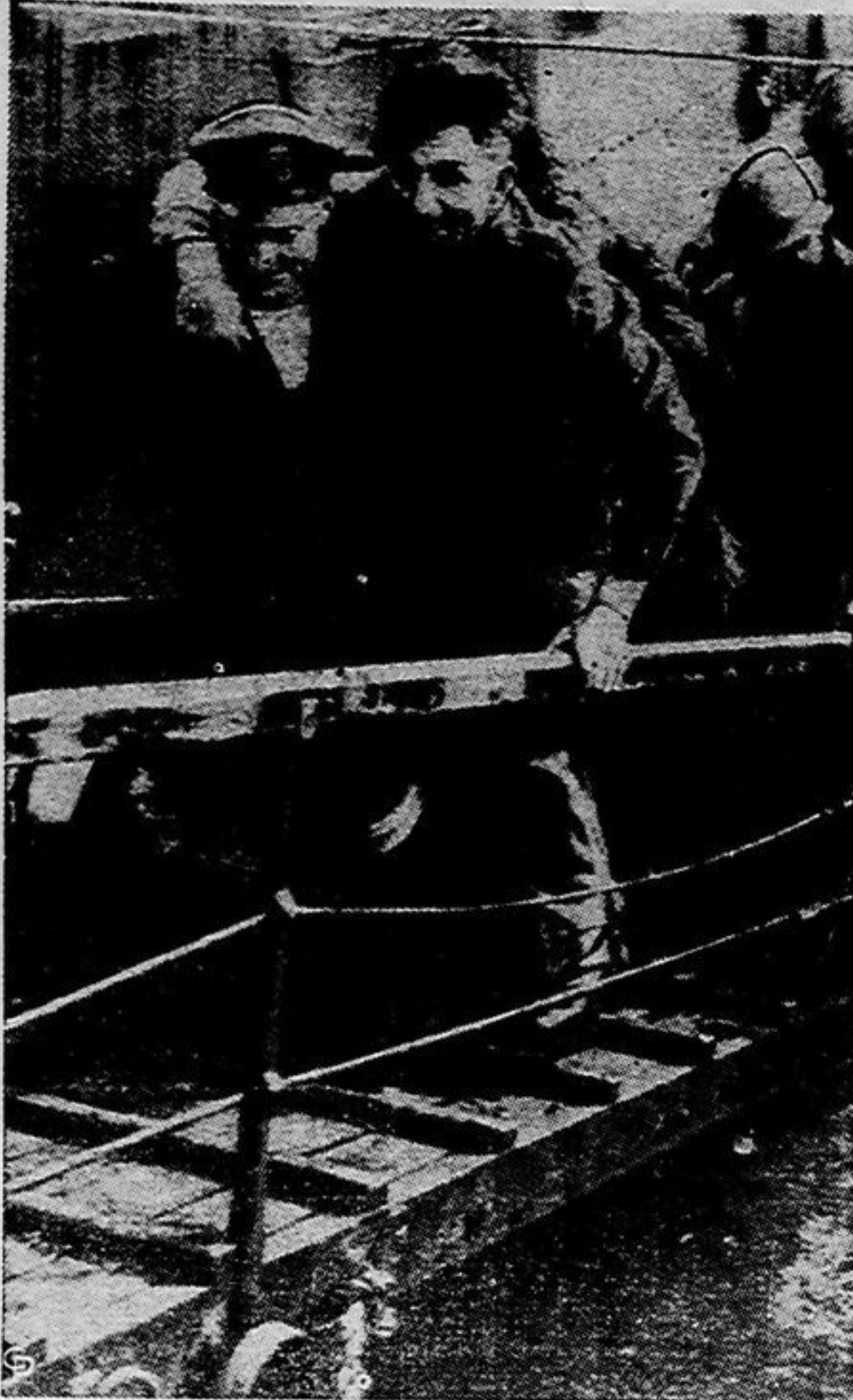
**THE LESSON IN ITS SETTING**  
Time — About 520 B.C.  
Place — The city of Jerusalem.  
This lesson will be made particularly interesting if the teacher can secure some accurate statistics concerning church expenses in the community, comparing these sums with the sums of money spent upon pleasure in the same locality — movies, ball games, race-horses, slot machines, smokes, beverages, gasoline. Is it true that we are spending more for the maintenance of pleasure automobiles than for the maintenance of the house of the Lord?

**REBUILDING OF THE TEMPLE**  
Haggai 1:2. Thus speaketh Jehovah of hosts, saying. This people say, It is not the time for us to come, the time for Jehovah's own house to be built. The one great event in which Haggai and Zechariah took a leading part was the rebuilding of the temple. For the history of this event read Ezra, first six chapters, together with the books of the two prophets themselves. In the second year of Darius (520 B.C.), the Jews were suffering from drought, possibly from a drought prolonged over some years. A sense of failure lay upon the people. In a prosperous season a prophet might have spoken in vain, but now that the people were softened by adversity, they were disposed to listen. The time had come, and the man, this was Haggai, a prophet of whose antecedents nothing is known. He declared that the scarcity from which the Jews were suffering was a reminder from Jehovah to stir them up to consider their ways.

**FINISH THE WORK**  
3. Then came the word of Jehovah by Haggai the prophet, saying, 4. Is it a time for you yourselves to dwell in your celled houses, while this house lieth waste? 5. Now therefore thus saith Jehovah of hosts: Consider your ways. 6. Ye have sown much, and bring in little; ye eat, but ye have not enough; ye drink, but ye are not filled with drink; ye clothe you, but there is none warm; and he that earneth wages earneth wages to put it into a bag with holes. 7. So thus saith Jehovah of hosts: Consider your ways. 8. Go up to the mountain, and bring wood, and then build the house; and I will take pleasure in it, and I will be glorified, saith Jehovah. 9. Ye looked for much, and lo, it came to little; and when ye brought it home, I did blow upon it. Why? saith Jehovah of hosts. Because of my house that lieth waste, while ye run every man to his own house. 10. Therefore for your sake the heavens will withhold the dew, and the earth will withhold its fruit. 11. And I called for a drought upon the land, and upon the mountains, and upon the grain, and upon the new wine, and upon the oil, and upon that which the ground bringeth forth, and upon men, and upon cattle, and upon all the labor of the hands. Here the prophet directly accuses the people of being concerned primarily with their own comfort, and sinfully neglecting to rebuild the temple where the worship of Jehovah should be resumed. They justified such negligence by saying that the time had not yet come to rebuild the temple, and it was the prophet's purpose to bring them to a realization that they had been living upon the foundation of a mistaken sense of relative values, that they had given secondary consideration to what should have been first, and they were giving first consideration to what should have been secondary. The evil is common, but it is disastrous. The social consequences in national and civil life that had followed such negligence the prophet now vividly depicts, with the implication that if they would come back to God and give Him first place in their life, such failure and impoverishment and tragedy as they were beholding would pass.

**RENEWED ENERGY**  
12. Then Zerubbabel the son of Shealtiel, and Joshua the son of Jehozadak, the high priest, with all the remnants of the people obeyed the voice of Jehovah their God, and the words of Haggai the prophet, as Jehovah their God had sent him; and the people did fear before Jehovah. The prophet had not more than finished his message, than the entire remnant of the people felt the quickening of new courage, and set about at once to rectify the situation. Especially was the spirit of Zerubbabel, the governor of Judah, stirred up, so that the people "came and did work in the house of the Lord of Hosts, their God. (Zerubbabel was the leader of the captives who returned in response to the decree of Cyrus. He

partment of Agriculture, Toronto. This is Yellow Rocket, a perennial weed which appears in new parts of the Province each year and which is apparently on the increase. It is usually found in low, damp parts of the fields.

### RESEMBLES MUSTARD

Upon close examination Yellow Rocket will be found to resemble Mustard only in the colour of the flower. It may be easily distinguished from this weed by its dark green, smooth and shiny leaves, somewhat oval in outline. It is usually in flower from May to July, and matures seed during July and August.

Hand pulling of scattered plants, drainage and thorough cultivation in preparation for a spring crop will keep it under control.

### DON'T LET IT MATURE

The seed of Yellow Rocket is a common impurity in clover and alfalfa seed and has been listed as a secondary noxious seed in the Canada Seeds Act. This weed should not be permitted to mature seed, particularly in the clover seed producing areas.

Learn to distinguish Yellow Rocket and eradicate it before it becomes established, advises Mr. MacLeod.

## Most Dangerous Ages: 16 to 23

Canadian Welfare Council Expects Wave of Post-War Delinquency in Boys and Girls

The aftermath of war with its social maladjustments will strike most forcibly at the boy and girl between 16 and 23 years of age, Miss Charlotte Whitton, executive director of the Canadian Welfare Council told the Canadian Conference on Social Work at its biennial convention in Toronto.

"The boy and girl of these ages 'will be the highly vulnerable centre of the war's disintegrating blows,'" Miss Whitton said in advising the convention that the Canadian Welfare Council "is strengthening its delinquency division" and has been consulted recently by two Provinces "on better provisions for certain types of delinquents."

### THEY'LL BE MOST VULNERABLE

Miss Whitton said the need for protection of juvenile immigrants assumes "difficult angles" with the possible movement of child refugees to this continent. "It is hoped that from the continuing negotiations of the Canadian National Committee on Refugees, arrangements will be concluded with the Canadian Provinces and the child-caring services of Canada, whereby aid will be assured for these children both overseas and in Canada," she said.

## Arctic Talks To Antarctic

Alaskan Wireless Station, Byrd's Aides Gossip About Weather

When distinguished scientists established communication virtually between North Pole and South Pole what do they talk about?

"Why, even as you and I — the weather."

Stanton D. Bennett, operator of amateur wireless station K7BUB established contact last month with station KA7USA at the west base of Little America in the Antarctic where members of the Byrd expedition are encamped.

### NORTH, SOUTH POLE

Speaking over a telephone line from his home three miles from Bennett's station, Dr. Ervin H. Bramhall, member of Byrd's 1933 Antarctic expedition and now professor of physics at the University of Alaska, talked with Dr. Alton Wade, in charge of the west base, and his fellow scientists. The conversation went something like this: Bramhall — "It's spring time in the Arctic. Trees are green, flowers are blooming, and the temperature is around 60 above."

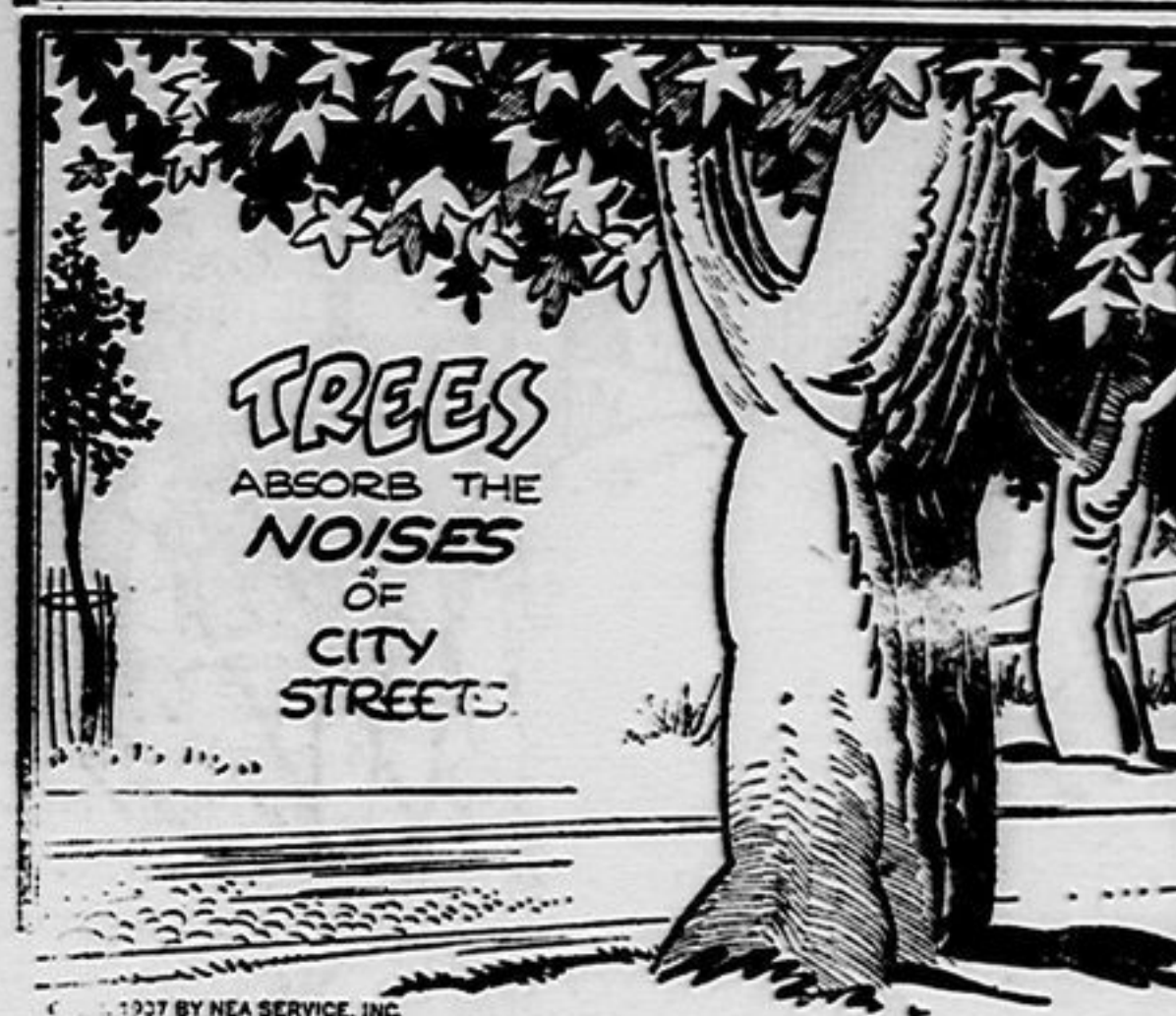
Wade — "Winter's approaching rapidly. During the current cold spell the temperature has been hovering around 70 below."

## Group Reading Is Recommended

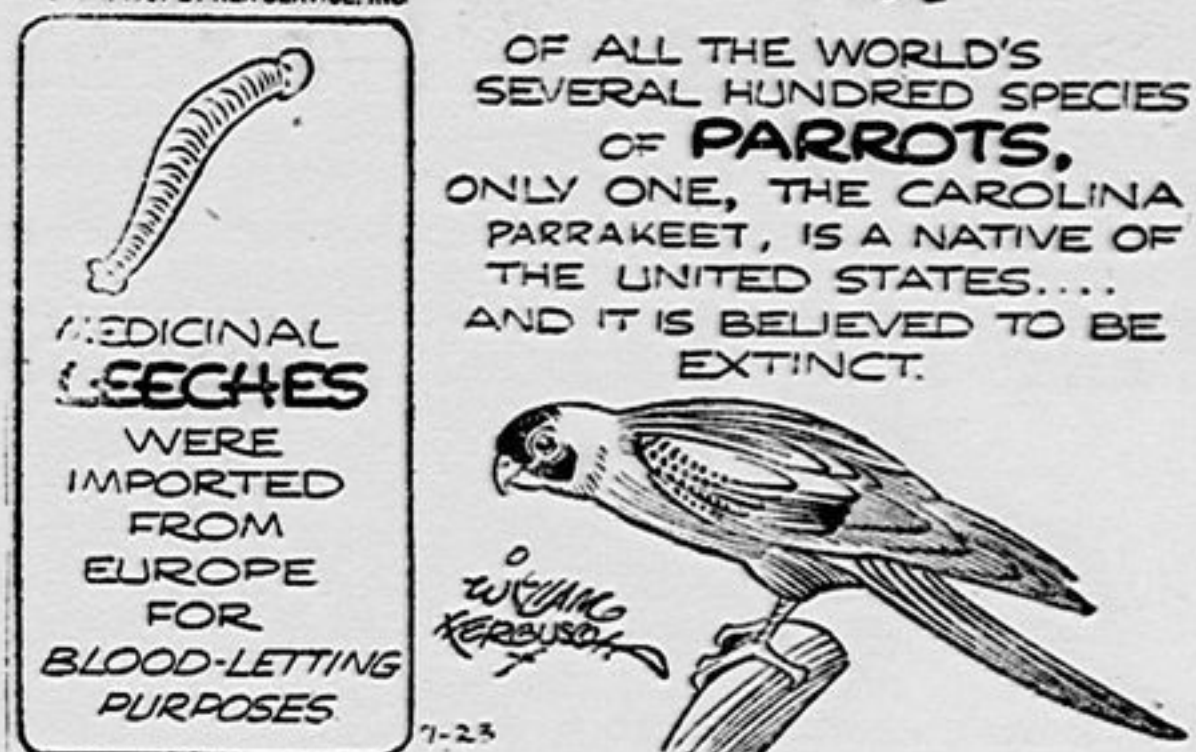

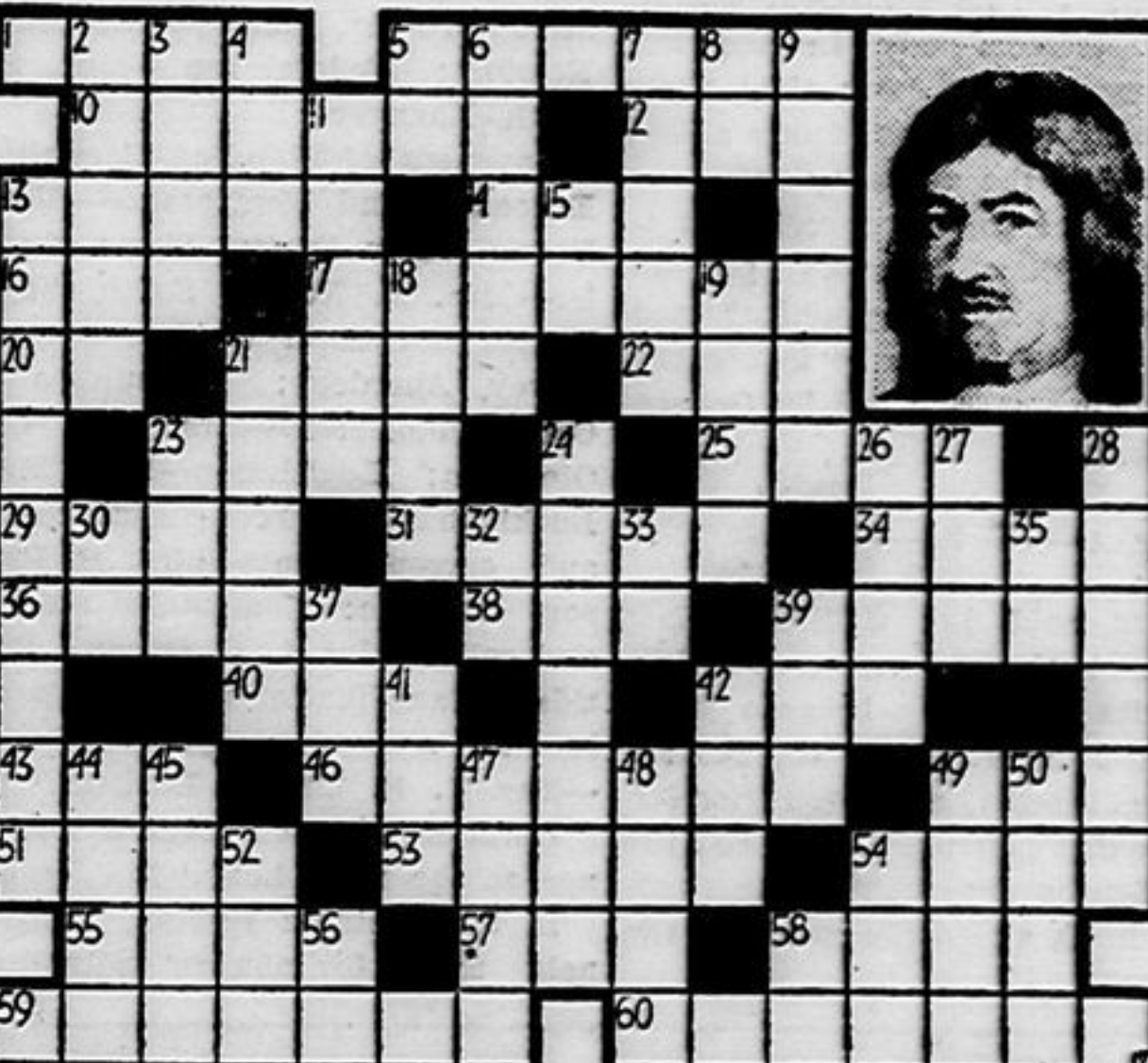
