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Radio Tower Erected for Owen Sound Station

Work on the new transmitter station and the new 180 foot steel radio mast for Radio Station CFOS, Owen-Sound, in Sydenham Township, at Starvation corner, is now nearing completion.

Base of the tower goes down to solid rock, and is securely bolted there. The tower itself was fabricated by the Canadian Bridge Co. Ltd., of Walkerville, whose steeple-jacks, under the foreman, F. Losier, are in charge of the erection.

The tower was built of welded sections each about 22 feet in length. The painting of it is in bright orange and white, so that it may be easily seen by aircraft cruising in the vicinity.
