Reunion at Topcliffe at Close of School

Dominion Day afternoon and evening was fair and fine, though a trifle cool for the big reunion of Topcliffe, (South line, Gleneig), old boys and girls, with many friends from surrounding sections and towns as well. About five hundred was the enrollment, with possibly another hundred or more who neglected to register, so it was a bumper crowd, especially since a similar event was in progress only a few miles distant at the same time—at Swinton Park.

The registrar revealed that the homecomers were from far and near—the farthest distant being Chas. McKinnon of Bassano, Alberta. The President, Angus Hooper, and secretary Ernie Williams, with their committee, have had a busy season preparing for the day, and that it went off so smoothly and successfully, is a tribute to their efforts.

During afternoon and evening Mr. Cook of Flesherton, with his mobile studio, furnished good instrumental selections and songs, and also played for the round dancing in the evening. The programme in afternoon was in charge of Hector H. MacDonald, Clerk of Gleneig, one of the Top Cliff pupils around the turn of the century. In his introductory remarks, he read a reminiscent letter from John L. McKinnon, of Saskatoon, another former pupil, most of which is reproduced in another column. A bright program comprised music by the Chas. McDonald orchestra; solos by Alan Sinclair and Cecil Proudly; bagpipe music by Grant Muir and Alex. Cameron; Scotch songs by Roy Wiggins, Durham; song by Betty and Joyce Tucker; song with guitar accompaniment by Gordon Ransome. Mrs. P. Gagnon of Durham gave a short address, her grandfather, the late Alex. McPhail, being the man behind the organization of Top Cliff section away back in 1862. Reeve John McGirr also gave a pithy address.

Interesting features were the remarks of three former teachers, who spoke of experiences during their teaching days there: Mrs. John Stevenson (Lizzie Binnie), Mrs. Wm. Patterson (Jean Floyd), and Miss McKay. The latter taught 1 1/2 months only, relieving Miss Jessie Black (now Mrs. Glen Allen).

During the program, two minutes silence was observed for the old pioneers of the district, and in memory of the boys of the section and teachers who fell overseas in the Great War.

No Convictions at Friday's Police Court

Although there were several cases before Magistrate Spreeman at the local police court last Friday, no sentences were imposed and only two fines levied.
The main action was the Crown vs. Elmer Braun. Marie McDonald had charged that Braun hit her on face and broke her glasses during an argument in a car the previous Sunday evening, accompanied by four other young people. The plaintiff admitted first hitting Braun, while he denied the charge. The Magistrate dismissed the case, and allowed no witness fees.

WILLIAM THOMPSON
Well known throughout South Grey, Mr. William Thompson who for the last twenty years has resided on his small farm on Lambton St. just east of Durham, died in Durham Hospital on Monday evening in his seventy-ninth year. In recent weeks he has been in poor health, spending a week with his nephew, Wm. in Normanby, and the last eight days in hospital.

The deceased was born in May 1862 in Normanby township near Ball's Corners. When a young man he farmed for a few years in Dakota, and returning to Ontario, he lived in Normanby until moving to Gleneig adjoining Durham 20 years ago.
