25 YEARS AGO (From Review file, July 29th, 1915)

Lieut. H. C. Young, of Hanover, was in town Monday to secure recruits, who are to leave soon under Lieut. Young's command for the concentration camp at Niagara. Four signed up here, Alfred Heather, Geo. Lloyd, Norman McDonald, Sam Hartford.

The grounds of Doctor Pickering, Insp. Campbell and Mr S. F. Morlock were ablaze with light and beauty in decoration at the Red Cross garden party Tuesday night. Messrs Pickering and Morlock conceived the happy thought to utilize their combined lawns for this purpose and ably assisted the ladies in arranging for the lawn fête.

Over sixty electric lights were strung over the grounds, while flags and bunting adorned verandahs, tables and booths.

On Wednesday evening of last week a number of friends of the Rev. Father Ferguson met at the Central Hotel to present the Rev. gentleman with an expression of their sorrow at parting and of their good will in the shape of an address and purse.
