**FRENCH SHIPS HERE ARE REQUISITIONED**

Nine French ships in the Canadian ports of Sydney, Halifax, Montreal and Vancouver have been requisitioned by Canada under the Defence of Canada Regulations. Authority to dispose of these ships and their cargoes and any other ships that may be later requisitioned was granted by Order-in-Council.

**IN DAYS OF YORE**

**25 YEARS AGO**  
(From Review file, Aug. 26, 1915)

The Victoria Cross has been conferred upon Lieut. Frederick W. Campbell, Mount Forest, of the First Canadian Battalion for conspicuous bravery on June 15th at Givenchy, when he took two machine guns over a parapet, arrived at the German first line with one gun, and maintained his position there under the heaviest of rifle, machine gun and bomb fire, while almost the whole of his detachment had been killed or wounded. Lieut. Campbell subsequently was wounded and has since died.
