### Knisley Family Hurt in Head-on Collision

Five members of the Wm. Knisley family, Normanby, with Mrs. Knisley's brother Norman Carson are in Guelph hospital this week recuperating from injuries received about 8.15 p. m. Sunday evening in a head-on collision six miles west of Guelph, while en route to Kitchener. Fortunately their car, a Ford V8, was not travelling over 25 miles an hour, none are seriously injured, and they are expected home at end of this week.

Mrs. Knisley had her face cut and a deep gash in forehead. Marjorie Knisley, aged 12, the oldest daughter, suffered a swollen jaw. Helen, aged 11, has a broken leg; Isabel, aged 9, has a gash in forehead, and the 5 months' old baby was uninjured. Norman Carson, the driver, has a broken collar bone, and was rendered unconscious for a little while after the accident. A lady friend from Huntsville escaped unhurt.

Norman Carson, who is a barber in Huntsville, had motored down to his sister's home that morning, and with Mrs. Knisley and four of their seven children, decided to spend the evening with friends in Kitchener, leaving about 7.00 p. m. When nearing their destination, in rounding a curve in the highway about six miles west of Guelph, their car collided with another car coming east, the front wheels of the cars interlocking. Two men were in the other car, one of whom was badly hurt. Both cars were insured. The injured were promptly conveyed to Guelph hospital, where they are making a satisfactory recovery from shock and wounds. The daughter Helen Knisley with her broken limb, will have the longest tenure of suffering.

It is hoped all will have sufficiently recuperated to be removed to their home west of Barber's Corner, after a week's convalescence in hospital. Mr. Knisley and Mr. John McKenzie drove to Guelph on Monday to see the wounded. Three other Knisley children were left for the night at Mr. Harry Caldwell's, where they yet are, until Mrs. Knisley is able to again take charge.

### 2,887 Single Men, 19 to 45 in Grey-Bruce

Mr. J. C. McDonald of Chesley, assistant registrar for the riding of Grey-Bruce, informs us that the registration last week of all persons in Canada over the age of 16 years reveals that there are 2,887 single men and widowers, without dependents in the riding between the ages of 19 and 45.

This was the age group which the registrars were asked to compile separately and forward to Osgoode Hall, Toronto, as the calling of men to the colors will be done through the judiciary.

It has been reported that the first age-group will be called for military service on October 1, but this is not official, so far as we have learned.

Further breaking down the figures it is found that over half the single men and widowers without dependents in Grey-Bruce are between 19 and 25 years of age. The total in this class is 1,485.

### Finances of Municipalities are Improved

Financial position of Ontario municipalities is sounder now than at any time during the last 20 years, Hon. Eric Cross, provincial minister of municipal affairs and public welfare, told the annual convention of the Ontario municipal association.

Mr. Cross said the total tax levy of all municipalities in 1939 was the lowest per capita levy in two decades. He said there had been "striking" reductions in debt in the last 10 years as well as in reductions in taxation. At the same time there had been an increase in assessment and population.

### Finnish Official Tells of Their War

Mr. Lodfellow, a native of Finland who fought in the Great War and who in recent Russian-Finnish war was in charge of Finland's propaganda dept. was in Durham last weekend as a guest of Col. Fraser Hunter M. P., and while here, was induced to address a public gathering in the Town Hall on Friday evening.

Most of the Volunteer Civil Guard were present to hear an interesting first hand story of Finland's fight against gigantic odds, but not many others were privileged to hear him, owing to the short notice given.

Mr. Lodfellow fought in the war in 1918, was badly wounded, and placed on the reserve list. He was introduced by Col. Hunter who remarked that the Finnish army didn't require officers—they were individualists and every man knew how to act on his own initiative.

The speaker of the night, Mr. Lodfellow, has a little accent, but has quite good English. He deemed it an honour to talk to a Canadian audience. The Finns never were serfs, but always a free people.

Russia did away with the Finnish army 30 or 40 years ago; while they have statues of writers and artists they have none of soldiers. Russia has never been able to conquer Finland. It is a land of lakes, rocks, marshes and forests; there the forest is the people's friend; it makes them individualistic. Planners cannot operate in forests; they act as individuals there after they know orders.

The recent war against Russia was a fight against tremendous odds. He told of the Finn method of capturing tanks—waiting hidden in bushes or shrub at side of road until within 30 feet, then jumping on tank, igniting it, bottle of gasoline and throwing it on operators of tank. One Finn alone destroyed 30 of them. Not only their knowledge of the forest aided them; they made great preparations for attack in it, and prepared places of defence. He told of how 7 machine guns carefully placed had wiped out a whole Russian battalion coming across ice.

The Finns are a very religious people. Last Christmas morning at 6 o'clock, the whole Finnish army along a 150 mile front, held a sing-song, and not one Russian fired a shot while it was in progress. It was at the end of February that the Russians swept through at the only place they could, into Finland—in open fields at the south-east. There they broke through along a 12 mile front, blasting their way by firing 300,000 shells in one 24 hour period alone.

The Finns, he closed, have the will to live and fight for live things. "No one can ever conquer us."

### First 30,000 to Be Called to Move into Camp Oct. 9th

The first 30,000 men called up for 30-days military training under the Mobilization Act, it is expected, will move into camp on Oct. 9th. Defence Minister Ralston told a press conference. By that date they will have been selected and given physical examination.

What age class other than the 21 year class will be called up at that time will depend on the number of men this class will provide. The boards that will control the drafts in each military district will be notified of the number of men required there to provide the 39 training centres with 30,000 men.

Plans call for two training periods of 30-days each before the New Year. A space will be allowed after the first classes have completed their training and before the second camps start to give departmental officials and army officers an opportunity to weigh the results of the first training period.

National War Services Department will provide transportation of the men from their homes to the training centres.
