IN DAYS OF YORE

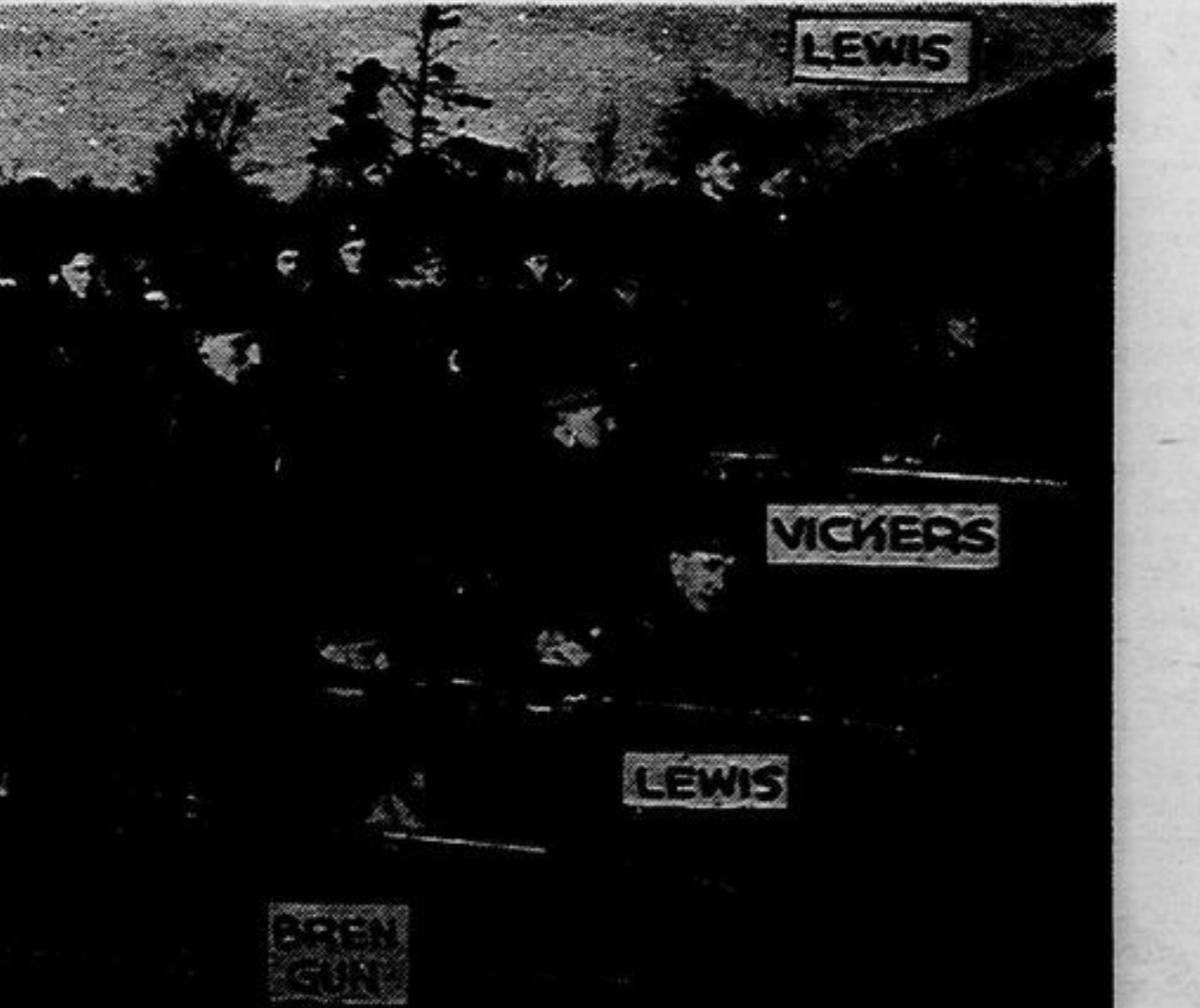
