This year John C. Hamilton of Clenelg, a mile east of Durham, is copping all the honors. He last week learned that he had won first place in the Province for the best insurance risk, a contest held by the Wawanesa Insurance Co. among the 1st prize winners of the various societies holding Farm and Home Improvement competitions throughout Ontario. Besides the honor of first place, a \$60 cash prize goes with it.

Three weeks ago the Review announced that John won first in Ontario in the Home Improvement contest sponsored by the Farmers' Magazine, with a cash prize of \$150. Then before that John captured first place in Durham Agricultural Society's field crop competition, and first in their local Home Improvement Contest. Two firsts in the district, and two more in the whole province, is surely a unique record for one year.


