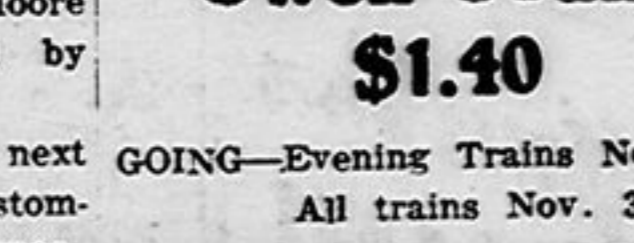
We understand the Presbyterian Church will install a lighting system and the Methodist Church possibly will at a later date.

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
