Nine Grey Municipalities

With heavy snow covering the county roads and sideroads of Grey the annual problems of plowing come once again to the fore. the corporation itself is still standing firm on the issue of no snow plowing under County auspices, Bert Lewis is doing the chores for winter work is left entirely at the discretion of the individual muni-Mr. Eastman, our teacher, was off cipalities. At the present time, nine municipalities of the County have made application for winter plowing. doing this, they contract to pay one half of the expenses of the work. The other fifty per cent is taken care of by the government subsidy supplied temporarily by the County

The stipulation is firm however, that: the money must be in the hands of the County Treasurer before any such work is done. To date, only two municipalities

have actually begun to plcw. These are Neustadt and Ayton in the south-western corner of the County. Neustadt contracts for the plcwing of the read from Hanover to Neustadt and Ayton pays the expense of plowing out the five mile link between Neustadt and Ayton. As much of this road lies on the Grey Bruce County line, the work is done by the Bruce County plcws and this arrangement is proving highly satisfactory. The opening up of this road during the winter months particularly important to a number of Neustadt men who are employed in Hanover factories.

Sullivan want to keep the road from Desboro to number 10 Highway open. In Egremont, application has been filed for the opening of the road from Holstein to Highway No. 6. Enphrasia plan on opening up the Valley Road and Osprev Township plan on keeping the road from Singhampton to Flesherton plowed out.
