ONTARIO ASSEMBLY.

Toronto, Feb. 18th.

After routine and the transaction of some other business, the House went into committee on the resolution of Mr. Crooks respecting the School of Practical Science which recommended the sale of the property for \$28,000 and the appropriation of that amount to the building of a laboratory and the purchase of the necessary apparatus.

Considerable discussion took place upon the resolution and it was finally carried.
