

Dr. Schlieman's Treasures.

The following is an extract from a private letter received by the editor of the Troy Times, dated Athens, Greece, Jan. 18th, 1877: "Dr. Schlieman is now here residing from his labors; though, in fact, there is no rest for the man, for he will always be busy about something. He is preparing a book for the English press; and Murray will soon publish an illustrated volume giving all details relating to the late discoveries of our distinguished archaeologist, who has justly won a world-wide name. The Mycenaean treasures are here deposited in the national bank for safe keeping until the second story of the polytechnic building is ready, where it has been decided they shall be placed for security and permanent exhibition. I have seen all these treasures, and handled many of the interesting objects. The weight of the gold itself is about 20 pounds. The objects have been photographed, and the pictures, which will in time probably be circulated more or less throughout the civilized world, are exceedingly interesting. Of the originals, the objects themselves, it may be said that one possessed of the least taste cannot help admiring them for their wonderful beauty both in form and execution. They were about 36 feet under the surface of the earth. Their antiquity must date back to a period not less than 1,000 or 1,200 years before Christ, whereas these remarkable objects testify the human intelligence, ingenious minds and cunning hands manifested their power as conspicuously and impressively as in our day. It is regarded as a higher civilization, than the existence of a dinner given by Dr. Schlieman to some of his intimate friends here, he exhibited an oil painting of the remains of Agamemnon, as he has no doubt the skeleton to be, recently exhumed by him at Mycenae. The painting is well executed, and is a graphic portrait of the subject represented. We counted his teeth, measured his proportions, and discussed the old fables as to his fate. I should say Agamemnon was physically well proportioned, and in that respect he is a man of parts. The skeleton itself is carefully guarded at Mycenae; it cannot be removed by ordinary means without destroying it, but it is to be hoped some day it may be brought to take its place with the valuable treasures, many of which, no doubt, were seen and handled by Agamemnon himself.

The Russian Grand Duke Alexis, the Grand Duke of Constantinople, and members of their suite, arrived in New York on Saturday evening, and went quietly to the Clarkson House. After dinner they went to the Eagle Theatre, and thence to Delmonico's, where they supped. On Saturday the Grand Duke Alexis walked about the city, accompanied by his bull-dog, and the Grand Duke Constantinople went to the Greek Church. Both gentlemen desire privacy, and wish to be allowed to enjoy themselves after their own fashion, without the fuss and ceremony necessary attendants upon a public recognition of their social rank in their own country.

Canada has succeeded during the "commercial" depression than any country of which we have authentic record. While the trade and navigation returns of Britain during January last showed an improvement in most branches of trade, the imports amounted to nearly thirty-three millions sterling—about two and a quarter millions more than in 1876, and half a million more than in 1875. This excessive importation, however, consists chiefly of provision and raw material. The exports for the month were \$13,945,000, or less than half the imports for the same period, a falling-off of more than a million sterling from 1875. The Times attributes this check upon exportation and the declining prices, principally to the political uncertainty which for so long has held a paralyzing influence over the commercial world, and which has more or less affected all nations.

The O'Mahony Remains.—The remains of O'Mahony arrived in Dublin Monday morning. The funeral committee received the corpse at the railway terminus. The coffin, placed in a hearse, was escorted through the streets by a torchlight procession, in which 8,000 persons took part. On the railway between Cork and Dublin, people flocked to the station to witness the passage of the train with the remains, and a large assembly at Charlesville Junction; 500 persons awaited the arrival at King's bridge. The procession, however, was deferred till dark. A disorderly crowd blocked the road to the terminus. The procession, with several bands playing pipes, began to move at 8 p.m., and marched along the quays. One account says there were 200,000 spectators. The remains were taken to the Mechanics' Institute, in the hall of which they will lie in state until Sunday. Despite the efforts of the committee, thousands forced their way into the building after the remains were deposited therein.
