Under the mended act it will be necessary for the insolvent to pay fifty cents on the dollar on his unsecured debts, or to prove to the satisfaction of the Judge that the estate was sufficient to pay a dividend to that amount if it had been properly managed by the Assignce; or that the insolvent had notified his creditors that he was unable to meet his engagements and they failed to take proceedings in insolvency against him.
