CIVIL SERVICE REFORM. The decided action taken by President Hayes in reference to government appoint ments, has elicited commendation from all friends of good government. Heretofore there was a complete change made in the civil service; all the old officials had to give way to new men, who claimed the position as a reward for services rendered in the election of their candidate to the Presidency. Men were appointed not on ac count of any peculiar fitness for the duties to be performed by them, but simply on account of political influence. The thinking men of the United States have long been convinced of the necessity of reform in this matter, but the difficulty was to get a President who had the courage to act independent of party, and the firmness to resist the influences which were brought to bear upon the executive in favor of cand dates for office. Mr. Hayes, has thus far, met public expectation in this respect. H has had the courage to go outside his own party in selecting the members of his Cabinet, and although he has met with the opposition of some of the extreme Repubof the nominations made, and his appointments have all been confirmed.
