DOMINION FINANCES.

The opposition Press charges the present Government with having increased the public expenditure to a large amount since they came into power. To prove this a a load of hay and breaking his neck. statement is given of the expenditure under Sir John's administration as con pared with that of last year. For instance in 1871-2 the total expenditure was \$17,-589,468, and in 1875-6 it amounted to \$24,488,872 showing an increase of about \$7,000,000. Now to get a correct idea of this niatter we must take the expenditure for several years and ascertain when the increase took place. Of course it must be borne in mind that the Dominion is growing rapidly and new Provinces are being added to it which necessitates an increase in the public expenditure.
