There was very little yet to be put under contract, but it would be put on contract as soon as possible. The Welland Canal, when finished, would be a complete work of twelve feet, and with all the locks for fourteen feet. The expenditure of \$3,000,000 at present for the purpose of obtaining the two additional feet had to be considered very carefully under present circumstances. While there was no one more desirous of deepening it to that depth, it did not seem three times as much as for twelve feet. The cost for twelve feet would be about \$1,500,000; for fourteen feet \$5,000,000. The new acqueduct on the Welland Canal was the most serious part of the works not yet commenced. The old acqueduct was too small in depth and sectional area, and yet it was found necessary to construct a new one which would be fourteen feet in depth. It would have been possible to have done a little more, but not profitably but everything possible had been done en both it and the Lachine Canal. He hoped the members of the House would take a reasonable view of the matter. The motion was agreed to.
