Dundalk, May 3, 1877. THE WAR. The Eastern question which has occupied the attention of the world for a long time, and which the wisest statesmen of Europe, have vainly endeavored to settle is now to be decided by the sword. The negotiations during the past winter, which were looked upon as likely to prove successful, produced no good results, and it seems that Russia was only taking advantage of the delay caused by the discussion of the proposed terms of peace, to make preparations for the war which she had determined upon. It is very interesting to Emperors, previous to entering upon a certain war with a neighboring power. There is always a feasible excuse for the quarrel, and an apparent disinterestedness manifested, which is highly to be applauded. In the present case, the Emperor of Russia enters upon the contest with great reluctance, after having exhausted every peaceful means of securing the object desired. He takes a deep interest in the welfare of the Christian subjects of the Porte, and it is solely to secure the amelioration of their condition, that he draws the sword. He gives the most solemn assurances to the other powers, that he has no intention of annexing any territory to his dominions, or of self aggrandizement, but that his interference on behalf of his distressed coreligionists on Turkish soil, is purely a work of brotherly love. We wonder if any one is so simple, as to place the least confidence in such professions as these. The Crimean war resulted in the humiliation of at Listowel on May 1st. Mr W. G. Turkey on the other hand has plenty of men, but of soldiers very few. The army is supplied with good weapons, most of them being manufactured in England, but very little reliance can be placed upon the efficiency of the troops. or the strength of the force which can be brought against the enemy. The Turkish power is rotten, all the officials high and low, seem to be thoroughly corrupt. Peculation, fraud and lying, characterise the whole of them, and although the soldiers would fight well if properly managed, yet the dishonesty of those who have control of affairs is so great, that the money which should be expended in furnishing necessary supplies, is stolen by the officials, and the azmy is left to suffer for want of equipment and even food. In a contest between Russia and Turkey alone, there is little doubt but that the former will be successness of Russia. It is quite apparent that dress and good voice.
