The members of the Senate being assembled, His Excellency was pleased to command the attendance of the House of Commons, and that House being present, the Bills passed by the House, the most important of which will give next week were assented to in Her Majesty's name by His Excellency the Governor-General.

The War in the East.

A special from Constantinople states that the Sultan in his proclamation to the troops declares that in case of need he will join the army with the Standard of Prophet, and sacrifice his life for his people. Part of the English fleet has been ordered to the Bosphorus, and a fleet is held in readiness for a reserve. The Constantinople newspapers report that an engagement has taken place on the Asiatic frontier near Ardahan, and that the Russians were compelled to fall back.
