is also said to have been exceedingly vicorous. The Russian troops now in the Dobrudscha have been ordered to advance as quickly as possible upon the line of the railway connecting Tchernavoda on the Danube with Kustendje on the Black Sea: and that point having been reached the right wing of the centre army will force the passage of the river higher up. In Asia Minor heavy fighting has been going on in the neighbourhood of the Deli-

baba Pass. The Russians, who commenced the attack, were on Wednesday and Friday last first repulsed and then driven from their entrenchments. The losses on both sides were very great, but they were especially so with the Russians. Success has also crowned the Turkish arms in northern Armenia, where the siege of Batoum has been raised, the besieging force having been driven from the position com-

manding the town. From Montenegro an extraordinary report comes, to the effect that the Prince of Montenegro is missing, and is supposed to have been murdered by his infuriated soldiers in consequence of the recent defeats.

The latest announcements respecting the attitude of Great Britain are to the effect that the English Cabinet has disapproved of Prince Gortschakoff's declaration of Russia's policy, and has resolved not to allow even a temporary occupation of Constantinople by the Russians. On the other hand, it is reported in London that in the event of the Russian troops in Asia Minor capturing Erzeroum an armistice will be proposed with a view to negotiations for the conclusion of peace.

The Turks have evacuated and the Russians have occupied Hirsova. Up to Monday 28,000 Russians had crossed the Danube at Ibraila.

The bombardment of Rustchuck continued all Tuesday. The English consulate, which had a large Union Jack floating. seems to have been singled out for a concentrated fire, and was completely de-

A despatch from Erzeroum says: -Mukhtar Pasha has won a great victory and taken 1,000 Russians prisoners. A fresh attack by the Russians on Batoum is expected. One thousand Russians capitulated at Bayazid.

The report of a conspiracy to blow up the Suez Canal was based on authentic information. The Khedive is taking effective measures to prevent such an attempt on land, while a sea police is being organized under two English officers.

THE JAPANESE REBELLION.-News from Yokohama states that the rebellion is still alive, but the ultimate success of the Imperialists is assured. The official returns of the casualties in the Satsuma rebellion show; killed in battle on the Imperial side. 2,135; died in hospitals, 824; wounded, 8,072; now in hospitals, 5,584.
