

Turco-Russian War.

From the summary of the Globe Tuesday morning's news from the seat of war is more than usually interesting, the preliminary operations on the Danube having commenced in earnest, and a series of important engagements being reported from Asia Minor.

In Asia Minor heavy fighting has been going on in the neighbourhood of the Delibala Pass. The Russians, who commenced the attack, were on Wednesday and Friday last first repulsed and then driven from their entrenchments.

The latest announcements respecting the attitude of Great Britain are to the effect that the English Cabinet has disapproved of Prince Gortschakoff's declaration of Russia's policy.

The bombardment of Rostuek continued all Tuesday. The English consulate, which had a large Union Jack floating, seems to have been singled out for a concentrated fire, and was completely destroyed.

A despatch from Erzeroum says:—Mukhtar Pasha has won a great victory, and taken 1,000 Russian prisoners. A fresh attack by the Russians on Batoum is expected. One thousand Russians capitulated at Batoum.

The report of a conspiracy to blow up the Suez Canal was based on authentic information. The Khedive is taking effective measures to prevent such an attempt on land, while a sea police is being organized under two English officers.

THE JAPANESE REBELLION.—News from Yokohama states that the rebellion is still alive, but the ultimate success of the Imperialists is assured.

The International African Commission in session at Brussels, has decided on organizing stations in Africa for the suppression of the slave trade, and despatching an expedition from Zanzibar in the direction of Lake Tanganyika.

In the Imperial House of Commons on Thursday week the Secretary of State for India was authorized to raise five million pounds sterling on the credit of the Indian revenues, in order to meet the deficit caused by the famine.

An horrible murder took place a few days ago at a place near Logan, Ohio. The victims were John Weldon, his widow, Mrs. Susan McChug, and Miss Nancy Hite, daughter of Mrs. McChug.

A three-year old child belonging to Mr. McAdams, of Turberry, who was on the track of the Toronto, Grey, and Bruce Railway, on Saturday, was struck by the engine of a passing train and thrown a distance of about twenty feet.

It is stated that the Union Forwarding Company's passenger steamer, Prince Arthur, was totally destroyed by fire at Portage du Fort on the Ottawa River, last week, and that the purser had a narrow escape from being burned to death.

The steamer "Manitoba" estimates that 3,000 emigrants have gone into Manitoba the present season. It is anticipated that the population of that section will be increased by at least 1,000 before the season closes.

The United States authorities are doing everything possible to facilitate emigration to and trade with the Northwestern provinces. They now permit grain to be sent down in sacks covered with wire, without the expense of bonding, sealing, etc., which makes an important saving to dealers of at least four cents a bushel.

Mr. David Beatty, P. L. S., will proceed to survey the township of Wilson, on the Ganaraska River, about forty miles north of Parry Sound. Mr. Byrne, P. L. S., is surveying the township of Mills, on the same river, and Mr. Fitzgerald will start to survey the township of Ferris.

The Galt Reporter says:—The first of these was the burning of Mr. Burt Smith's large barn, next the burning of a school house in section 9, Beverly, and during last week, just before six o'clock, two buildings belonging to a Mrs. Carter, and standing at least forty-five feet apart broke almost simultaneously into flame and were totally consumed.
