THE OKA TROUBLES. Some three weeks ago warrants were laid by the Roman Catholic authorities caused great excitement among the rest of the Indians belonging to the tribe to which those arrested belong, and as warants were out for the arrest of a large number of them they appear to have armed themselves for self-defence, preparatory to leaving Oka to escape arrest and imprisonment. The tribe of Indians against whom this charge riot has been preferred, number about 400, and belong to the Iroquois Nation. It ap pears that early in the last century the Island of Montreal was granted to the Roman Catholic Church, these Indians living on it at the time, and we expect with as much claim to it-or perhaps morethan any one else. This property becoming valuable in a few years time, the authorities over the church secured another grant from the King of France,-the Province being under French rule at the time,-of Indians from the Island of Montreal to the place where Oka village is now situated and giving them instruction, etc. This grant was afterward confirmed when the British gained possession of Canada. For nearly 150 years the Indians occupied and lived on the lands of this grant, and long as the Indians were obedient to the Roman Catholic Church, things appear to have gone on peaceably. Some years ago through the efforts of Missionaries sent out by the Methodist Church, the Iroquoi turned Protestant, and crected a chapel in which to hold meetings. For several years past the Roman Catholic authorities have been trying to disposses the Methodists and some time since destroyed the church erected by them, and appear to have entered into a regular system of persecution against the Indians, which culminated in the arrests referred to.
