

Turco-Russian War.

In Asia Minor the Russian retreat continues. The last battalions of the army before Kars have withdrawn from their entrenchments, and Mukhtar Pasha, with his main army, occupies a strong position eight miles to the south of the city. It is not expected that the Russians will be able to gain any more successes in this quarter this year, and their unfavorable situation is still further aggravated by a general rising of the Abchasian tribes in their rear. The country has suffered severely by the war, and a famine is expected in the districts of Alaoukirt, Kara Kilissa, and Beyazid.

Attempted Murder or Suicide.

(From the Kingston News, July 19.) At an early hour this morning a startling report was around town that a woman had been murdered by her husband in a house at the intersection of York, Orleans, and Barrie streets. So far as the fact of the woman's throat having been cut the rumor was true, the only question was, who did it? About eight o'clock this morning our reporter visited the house and obtained the following facts:—

THE MAN'S STATEMENT. The man who was said to have committed the deed, a Frenchman named Sayers, made substantially a statement to the effect that about five o'clock this morning, while he was lying in bed, his wife came into his room and sat down on a chair. Rising from this she again went to the trunk and opened it. The husband asked her what she was doing, and she said she was taking out her handkerchief. She then left the room, and the man says the next thing he heard was a shout. On getting up out of bed he found his wife on her knees in an adjoining room with her throat cut. In attempting to take the razor with which the deed was done from her, he says she cut him on the hand, and there certainly is a deep cut on his left hand. The doctor was sent for and the wounds dressed.

On making some enquiry into the probable cause, these facts were given by the husband:—He and his wife are natives of Ottawa. They have been in Kingston for about two years, and he says he has been in bad health. The wife, according to his story, had been in a dependent state for some time, and had frequently threatened to take his life or her own. Neither of the parties were in the habit of drinking, and the man could not account for the act except from the fact that she was out of her head. He also says his wife did take a little whiskey which happened to be in the house. The above is substantially what the man says about the case.

THE WOMAN'S STATEMENT. An interview was not had with the woman, but we are informed that she tells a very different story. At an early hour this morning she was in bed asleep, when her husband came into the bedroom and made a cut at her throat with a razor. She started up, and the blow fell upon her chin, slicing off a small piece. He then succeeded in cutting her throat, inflicting a very dangerous wound. In attempting to get the razor from the man her hand had been badly cut. She managed to get hold of the razor, which she threw down stairs. The shouting and noise awakened Alfred Sayers, a brother of the man, who was asleep downstairs, and on seeing what had occurred he alarmed the neighbors. The police and the doctor were sent for. Policeman Nesbitt, who lives near by, took charge of the premises.

WHAT THE NEIGHBORS SAY. Alfred Sayers did not speak any of the affair and so cannot speak positively. He gives his sister-in-law a good character, and says his brother has been sick for some time. No one could tell what was the matter with him. On being asked if he thought he was scheming, he smiled and said he would not like to say. His brother had five children, and he did not think his sister-in-law had ever done anything crazy.

A Frenchman living near says Sayers was not a good man and only feigned sickness. Mrs Sayers was a hardworking woman, went out washing to support her husband and children. His opinion was that jealousy had caused Sayers to murder his wife.

Other neighbors speak of Sayers as being a heavy drinker, and one man said that he thought that the deed must have been done in a fit of "blues." The doctor who was called—Dr. Fowler—says that from the nature of the wounds the woman could not possibly have inflicted them on herself.

The man Edward Sayers was brought down to the police station about ten o'clock, and brought before the police magistrate. He was charged with assault with intent to kill, and was remanded until the 19th instant. The condition of Mrs. Sayers has somewhat improved, and the doctor is of opinion that if inflammation does not set in she may recover.
