Attempted Murder or Suicide.

(From the Kingston News, July 12) At an early hour this morning a startling report was around town that a woman had been murdered by her husband in a house at the intersection of York, Ordnance, and Barrie streets. So far as the fact of the woman's throat having been cut the rumor was true, the only question was, who did it? About eight o'clock this morning our reporter visited the house and obtained the following facts:-

THE MAN'S STATEMENT. The man who was said to have committed the deed, a Frenchman named Sayers, made substantially a statement to the effeet that about five o'clock this morning, while he was lying in bed, his wife came into his room and sat down on a trunk. She afterwards got up and went to the window, where she sat down on a chair. Rising from this she again went to the trunk and opened it. The husband asked FLOUR. her what she was doing, and she said she was taking out her handkerchief. She then left the room, and the man says the next thing he heard was a shout. On getting up out of bed he found his wife on her knees in an adjoining room with her throat cut. In attempting to take the razor with which the deed was done from her, he says she cut him on the hand, and there certainly is a deep cut on his left hand. No one could tell what was the matter with him. On being asked if h thought he was scheming, he smiled and said he would not like to say. His brother had five children, and he did not think his sister-in-law had ever done anything

A Frenchman living near says Sayers was not a good man and only feigned sickness. Mrs Sayers was a hardworking woman, went out washing to support her husband and children. His opinion was that jealousy had caused Sayers to murder

his wife. Other neighbors speak of Sayers as being a heavy drinker, and one man said that he thought that the deed must have been done in a fit of "blues." The doctor who was called-Dr. Fowler-says that from the nature of the wounds the woman could not possibly have inflicted them on

The man Edward Sayers was brought down to the police station about ten o'clock, and broug! t before the police magistrate. He was charged with assault with intent to kill, and was remanded until the 19th instant. The condition of Mrs. Savers has somewhat improved, and the doctor is of opinion that if inflamation does not set in she may recover.




