

The Steamer "Victoria" Outrage

A gentleman who was on board the steamer "Victoria," at the time of the attempt on the captain's life, and who assisted to defend him, gives the following particulars of the affair in addition to those already published. He says that when the captain hauled down the Papal flag there was no one else on the deck except himself, and that the Union Jack was hoisted, and the captain was tying the bayonets, when Mr. Martin and three or four others attacked him, and attempted to choke him. They very nearly succeeded. While some half dozen hands were grasping his collar, and his face had grown black with the strangulation, one of the Pope's gallant soldiers deliberately scratched his face, and another cried: "Throw him into the river." At this time, the priests made no attempt to rescue him, nor did they until the captain was a Catholic, and the other that if the captain were killed, the country would flow with blood, because of it. The same gentleman urged the pilot to send men to the captain's assistance, but the "sailing-master" merely answered by shaking his head. Mr. McNeill, of Ottawa, who was on the vessel, was one of those who rescued the captain, and when he had done it was asked by Martin what right he had to interfere in the matter at all, and what right he had to hoist the Union Jack. After the disturbance the Zouaves held an indignation meeting on board, and inflammatory speeches were in order. One of the Pope's soldiers said that it was not the laws of this country that they had to obey; there were higher laws than those, and which they might respect before that. While the Orangemen might talk of the Battle of the Boyne, it was one gained by rank treachery; and now the Orangemen would not dare to walk on the Twelfth of July. When the vessel arrived at Montebello some seven or eight young men got on board, and the indignation meeting suddenly subsided.—Montreal Witness.

CANADA HAS MANY A WORTHIER SON THAN HE.—Sir John McDonald

Sir John McDonald intimated on Saturday night, speaking of himself, in regard to the Premiership of the Conservative Ministry, which he is so confident would come into power after the next general election. Thinking men, who remember and properly appreciate his past course, and think what its future would probably be, judging from his expressions in regard to it, will quite agree with him. Canada, which in this instance means the Liberal-Conservative party of Canada, has indeed many sons more worthy to be Premier than he, notwithstanding his great ability, his great experience, his possession of other qualities that well fit him to be a leader of men. His past course he has frequently commented on. Especially have we denounced that great iniquity which cost him so many admirers, which after all was only what might naturally have been expected to succeed his many lesser delinquencies practiced for many years, and culminating in such a great one, make it a public scandal that Sir John McDonald should be the undisputed head of one of the two great political parties of the Dominion. That he should again be the chief ruler of Canada would be a deep public disgrace. These indignities he characterized on Saturday night as "errors of indelicacy or imprudence." Other people do not view them so lightly, nor would Sir John if any political opponent had been the offender. One can imagine his eloquent denunciation of such conduct under different circumstances. Part of his speech on Saturday night was devoted to what he called a vindication of Sir George Cartier. Who is Sir John McDonald that he should vindicate Sir George Cartier? Riel, Lepine, and O'Donoghue, he alleged, were in the same boat. Were tarred with the same stick. So they were, except that O'Donoghue had a touch of Fenian tar as well as of Canadian treason, and murder, or homicide as Sir John kindly called it. Would it not be nice for O'Donoghue to receive the free pardon, which Sir John McDonald has pledged himself to work for, and then go round making speeches, and "vindictive" Riel and Lepine, less guilty than himself? From such a quarter all will recognize. In regard to his decency and value there would be little difference of opinion. There is room for as little in reference to Sir John's vindication of Sir George. The Liberal Conservative party has indeed many men worthy to be at the head of it, than Sir John McDonald, and we sincerely hope that the unworthy leaders will go into well-merited retirement, thus permitting some of the men who have clean hands and a pure heart to come to the front.—Montreal Witness.

The Governor-General is expected at Winnipeg on the 7th prox. It is believed that His Excellency will leave Montreal on the 24th inst.

A young man, belonging to a well-known gang of rowdies, was bayoneted on Wednesday afternoon by a sentry on duty at the Quebec Gate Barracks, in Montreal, with whom the former had interfered. The assailant died ten minutes after the wound was inflicted.

About four hundred navvies were discharged by the Hamilton and North-western Railway a few days ago, owing to the completion of grading on some sections. At Milton a gang is filling and levelling the station grounds. The bridge across the Grand Trunk at Georgetown is finished, and grading is going on perseveringly.
