

THE RENE MOVEMENT.—Mr. D. J. K. Rine, the temperance advocate, will commence a series of temperance meetings in Orangeville, on the 4th and 6th of September next.

POLICE MATTERS.—Yesterday the various Police Stations throughout Toronto were visited, but no arrests of drunkards were recorded. Beyond a few drunkards there are no arrests recorded.

A daring robbery of silks has been unearthed in Montreal. Two of the employees of S. J. Claxton & Co., along with a professional thief, have been systematically carrying off silks from the store. The property stolen exceeds \$20,000.

THE THOROLD MECHANICS' INSTITUTE held their ninth annual excursion on Monday, their destination this year being Toronto. The excursionists, numbering 500, reached this city at eleven a. m., by the Fictus. They found their way throughout the city by various routes, a large number of them going to the Queen's Park and the Gardens.

HORNBY'S MILLS, Aug. 16.—A daughter of Joseph S. Jamieson, formerly of Durham, now of the centre lines of Osprey, swinging along with an elder sister on the evening of the 16th inst., was accidentally thrown from the swing, and struck by the swift moving sea, on which her sister was yet standing. The blow broke her neck, death ensuing in a few moments. Deceased was thirteen years of age.

The surface of European Russia alone is about equal to that which Gibbon estimates for the whole Roman Empire, namely 1,600,000 square miles. With all the acquisitions made since the time of Catherine, the Russian Empire is still second in magnitude to the British, the latter being estimated to cover 8,711,135 square miles of the earth's surface, and the former 8,325,493 square miles. While the "Empire of all the Russias" rules by its autocracy will nearly 86,000,000 of subjects, no less than about 296,000,000 yield allegiance to Queen Victoria.

In a letter received from Manitoba by the Mayor of Guelph appears the following reference to the crops.—"The season has been an exceedingly unfortunate one, the prairies are even now covered with water, many feet in depth, rendering travel almost impossible, yet notwithstanding this drawback the crops are most luxuriant, far beyond anything I ever saw in Ontario. In conversation with farmers they one and all express themselves as hopeful and certain as to the future success of the country. Once the railway is running to Superior and the connections made at Pembina. So that the surplus produce of Manitoba can reach the eastern markets, land will jump to prices now only dreamt of."

Says the Oshawa Vindicator:—When Miss Blake awoke and saw a man in her room stealing her watch, she ought we suppose, according to the female code, to have screamed and gone into a faint, and allowed the watch to have been stolen. She did nothing of the kind, but coolly said "Put back that watch or I'll fire at you." The thief was a fool, but still he was sharp enough to understand that, and the watch was duly put back. This is an example we commend. Were it commonly understood that a woman has at all the powers she has for self-protection there would be fewer attacks on them.

RIDICULOUSLY SENSITIVE.—On Monday week, Mayor Beaudry, of Montreal, received a number of city passenger tickets, but on perceiving that they were of orange tint he fell into an alarming rage much to the surprise of those about him, and after calling the Company, a pack of 4 orange tickets, and that it was a fresh insult offered to the Roman Catholics of Montreal, asked why they had the impudence to print tickets in orange. Being referred to the President of the Company, that gentleman informed his Worship that no insult was intended to himself or his co-religionists by the orange color. His Worship contended to take blue tickets in place of yellow ones. It is stated that the president, after this little episode, immediately destroyed about 20,000 of the wrath-provoking tickets.

AGAIN HEARD OF.—John King, alias Brown, alias Segar, the notorious black-leg and crackman, who escaped from Constables Youngs and McTavish, of Aylon, while being conveyed to Owen Sound goal on the commitment of a magistrate's court in Normanby last month, has again been heard of, and seems to have reverted to his old courses. Shortly after his escape a horse was stolen from Mr. Helvig, near Neustadt; a set of harness from a resident of Neustadt, all on the same night. A person understood to be King was observed leaving the latter place early in the morning after the robbery. He seems to have afterwards turned up in Clifford, where he relieved a hotel keeper of a watch and a sum of money, escaping by the "skin of his teeth." A sharp look out is being kept for this "Slippery Jack," and it is hoped that he may finally be secured.—Mount Forest Examiner.

THE HAMILTON AND NORTH-WESTERN RAILWAY.—We take the following from the Globe's Hamilton Correspondence:—The construction of the Hamilton and North-western Railway is proceeding with almost unparalleled rapidity. The track has now been laid and the road ballasted about 23 miles north of Georgetown, beyond its intersection of the Toronto, Grey, and Bruce Railway, and a little west of the Mono Road. In another week the track will be laid, and the road ballasted as far as the county line of Simcoe. There remains but twenty-three miles of track to lay before reaching Barrie, and as the contractor is laying the track at the rate of a mile and a half a day, it will take but a comparatively short time to reach that terminus of the road. There are now 57 miles in running order north of Hamilton; and there is not a doubt entertained now that the whole line will be opened from Hamilton to Barrie, and the cars running over, by the 1st of October next allowing for all possible contingencies.

On Monday afternoon William Graham, a young man long from Scotland, was going quietly towards W. Bridge, Toronto, when a gang of eight or ten rowdies surrounded him, and one of them, John Durkin, attacked and beat him, the only reason being that they thought him an Orangeman. He escaped out of their hands, and by the advice of a gentleman who was passing brought a policeman to the spot. John Durkin was arrested and appeared this morning before the Recorder, who observed that society had reached a deplorable condition when an inoffensive man was attacked by a lot of cowards because he belonged to this, that, or the other party. Durkin was sent down for two months, with hard labor.
