to those in the North West. GREAT SEED FAIR .- The Galt Reformer of Wednesday says :- The Seed Fair held on the Market Square yesterday was attended by an unusually large number o farmers and buyers. It seems however, that a strange thing to the sellers tool place. The millers of the town were ac customed to paying \$1,20 per bushel, but finding the farmers flocking in with a large amount of the best wheat, the price was knocked down to \$1. At this the sellers became indignant and many of the farm ers left for home with their loads undis posed of. The morning continued dull, bu monotony was broken by a rise to \$1.10 per bushel, and later a further increase \$1,15 per bushel followed, and was sold at all day. Of course, at the prices offered the sales were not so large as might have been under more favorable circumstances. but nevertheless a considerable amount of business was transacted.

CANADIAN CATTLE.—The agricultural

correspondent of the Essex Standard who is, we believe an eminent breeder, of Suffolk-speaking of his recent visit to Liverpool upon the occasion of the show of the Royal Agricultural Society, says-"One of the great sights of Liverpool is the magnificent landing stage. Last week I, in company with Mr. Dyke, the agent of the Canadian Government, witnessed the landing of 215 Canadian fat cattle. Many of these were of superior quality and breed. They had to all appearance, suffered less during the voyage than I had expected to find. They were no more bruised and knocked than cargoes of Irish cattle landing at Liverpool or Holyhead commonly are, and they seemed as if a short rest would soon set them right. Among them were five very superior beasts-four bul locks and one heifer. These were exceedingly well bred, the heifer being nearly if not quite a pure-bred shorthorn. Her symmetry, color, and general condition eft little to be desired. These animals were fattened in a superior manner. One of them was a magnificent animal, even in company with the other four, which were fine ones also. The dimensions of the one in question, taken in my presence, were as follows .- From roots of horn to root tail, 8 ft. 9 inches, girth behind the shor der 9 feet 4 inches, height 5 feet 8 inches His live weight on leaving Quebec was 3,600 lb.
