

Miscellaneous.

Land scrip in Manitoba sold at \$55 a few days ago. Brigham Young died at Salt Lake City on the 29th inst. All Sunday work in the Globe office has been abolished.—Light. The Rev. Mr. Denechfield, Baptist, has left Elora for Brampton. Collingwood Battery of Artillery turns out for annual drill on the 2nd prox. A case of wife-beating, which may terminate fatally, has occurred at Allandale. The Free Press suggests Winnipeg as an excellent field for the Murphy movement. The Gore block, Paris, Ont. was destroyed by fire on the 28th inst. Loss \$15,000. The Rev. C. Lazenby, Primitive Methodist, was drowned at Plattsville lately while bathing. The value of the silk stolen from Clayton & Co., Montreal, has dwindled down to \$400. The Ministers of Agriculture and of the Interior left Ottawa last Friday night for Manitoba. The application for a writ of habeas corpus in the case of the Oka Indians has been refused.

An anti-Russian agitation in Poland is meeting with little countenance from the industrial Poles. The new Model School at Barrie was opened with twenty-five pupils—the full number allowed. The Union Pacific Railway Bridge at Omaha has been swept away, it is supposed by a cyclone. The miners who were on strike at Lasalle, Ill. have taken their grievance to the United States Court. The Mexican Government has thrown open to immigration extensive sugar and coffee lands in Oaxaca. Messrs. James Masie & Co. of Guelph, have effected a composition with their creditors at 50 cents on the dollar. A movement has been set on foot in Halifax with the view of submitting a Dunkin bill to the electors of the county. Twenty-five carpenters sailed from New York for Manchester, where they have a contract for three years' engagement. Ties have been laid for a distance of several miles from St. Boniface on the Pembina branch of the Pacific Railway. A Conservative Pic-Nic to be held at Mt. Forest shortly is spoken of. Sir John A. Macdonald has promised to be present. Mrs. Anna A. Hanson, sister of Rev. Charles Waters, committed suicide at Hartford, on Sunday morning last, by taking strychnine. The French Ministry have decided to present Gambetta for his speech at Lille, as well as all the journals which published objectionable addresses. Sitting Bull with 1,500 warriors has left North West Territory and re-crossed the boundary line into the United States. Daily times may be expected. A city of Mexico despatch announces a fatal fire in the Rosario mine, by which twenty-four lives were lost and many persons were seriously injured. Campbellford has been visited by another fire, by which a sack factory and two other buildings were more or less injured. Forty hands are thrown out of employment. The Guelph Herald urges that positive steps be taken for the incorporation of Guelph as a city. A committee has had a question under consideration for about six months. Business prospects in the West are regarded as being good, and St. Louis merchants inclined to believe that the volume of trade this fall will be even greater than in the Spring.

The McMillan of the first line of Erin had suspended by the neck to a tree in a bush a short distance from his home, on the 28th inst. So far no cause has been found for the rash act. The strike among the miners in the Lehigh region is at an end, the employers agreed to the strikers' demands, on condition that the advance in the price of warrants such a step. The Jacobs of the Croton Mills near Newburgh, was caught on a shaft and whirled with it at a fearful rate, when one of his arms was torn off, and he died two hours after the accident. The death is announced of Donald McPherson, Esq., ex-Governor of Bruce Township, who died at his residence at Tiverton, Wednesday last. Deceased was one of the early pioneers of Bruce County. Edward Tyler, President, and Mr. J. G. General Manager, of the Grand Rapids Railway, had an interview at Monday with Right Hon. Hugh Mackenzie, M. P., President, and Mr. J. G. General Manager, of the Great Northern Railway.

Union-spinners strike is imminent in the district of Lancashire. Unless agreement between the masters and men is reached by Friday, ten thousand of the number being unemployed by union.

Marquis of Lorne has just published one of the scorching books of Palmis in which alluding as closely as possible to the language of the original, he has carried the rhyming so as to adapt it to the pronunciation. He has also added seventy-five versions in various media and free rendering, together with many of Milton's psalms and many of the Paraphrases. The Marquis, while endeavoring to give harmony to form, alleges that "it is a mistake to twist rhyme the beautiful prose of the original and that it is best to sing the Scotch ballads."

The work is dedicated to the late Marquis of Lorne.

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A Pittsburg paper announces the organization of a mysterious secret order called the Universal Brotherhood. It is composed of labourers, mechanics, and farmers, lawyers, doctors, preachers, politicians, officeholders, bankers, bondholders, and speculators are rigidly excluded. No man is admitted to membership who is not engaged in some active industry involving manual labor. The order already numbers thousands, and will soon be organized in every ward in Pittsburg. Its object is to unite the labouring classes of every grade and profession in a common interest throughout the United States.
