The shipments of grain to Europe, on Saturday, by steamers alone, approached half a million bushels, and sailing vessels, during the week, took much more. Contracts have been so heavy of late that several lines have sent for extra steamers. Thus tar this season the shipments have exceeded those of last year by nearly 40 per cent. The crop being by 25,000,000 bushels greater than in any previous year in the history of the country, the demands of Europe can be readily supplied. Vast areas of land in Russia, the Slavonic provinces, and in Turkey, were planted last spring with wheat, but whether through a depletion of population in many districts it can be all gathered is uncertain.
